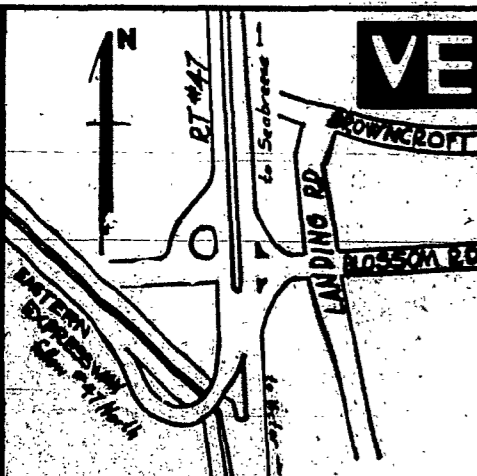

Elaine Tunaitis, a Nazareth Academy junior, has won a research grant in chemistry at the Rochester Institute of Technology for the summer.

This program, sponsored by the National Science Foundation, is designed to introduce high school students to actual research which they can continue in their own schools during the school year.

## Add Books on Race

A wealth of new books is being introduced into the school library at Notre Dame of Elmira. Many of the books deal with the subject of race, which "may be of the greatest importance to the future of the United States' relations with Latin American states and to our understanding of our own racial problems at home." This feeling has been expressed by author Marvin Harris in his book "Patterns of Race in the Americas."

Other works include "White Teacher in a Black School," in which Robert Kendall describes a picture of "incessant violence and seemingly indifferent attitude of school officials." Lerone Bennett's five essays trace the curve of Negro discontent and explain why the Americans of today face some of the most crucial decisions in the whole history of our country. These essays are compiled in the book "Negro Mood."

## 3 at Notre Dame Receive Grant
