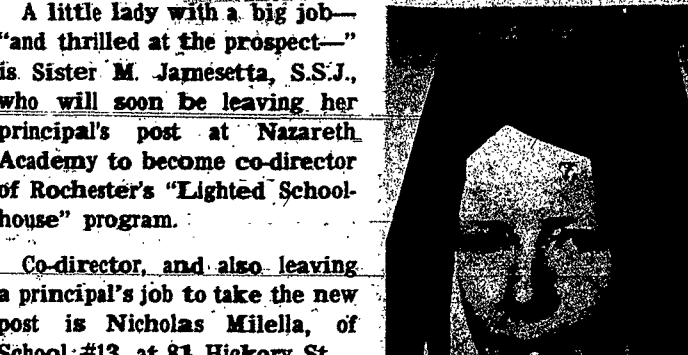

Sr. Jamesetta: Nun To Be Co-Director For 'Lighted Schoolhouses'

A little lady with a big job—"and thrilled at the prospect—is Sister M. Jamesetta, S.S.J., who will soon be leaving her principal's post at Nazareth Academy to become co-director of Rochester's "Lighted Schoolhouse" program.

Co-director, and also leaving a principal's job to take the new post is Nicholas Milella, of School #13, at 81 Hickory St.

Basically, the "Lighted Schoolhouse" program aims to extend special educational services to disadvantaged children and adults and will be financed by the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

Tentative plans call for 5 "lighted schoolhouses" to be set up in the near future, with others to follow later.

"The schoolhouse may turn out to be an available parish hall, or other adequate facility," Sister Jamesetta observed.

Asked if she would feel strange to be holding down such a "secular" job, Sister Jamesetta answered firmly: "The Church is committed to the poor—so I feel that I'm doing just what the Church should be doing."

The outgoing Nazareth principal will not be limited to working with Catholic students or schools. Public and private resources—both as personnel and material—will be used.

Part of the national "anti-poverty" drive, the program will concentrate on inner city areas to help those whose educational horizons have been limited by cultural deficits traceable more to poverty than anything else.

"Disadvantaged" means more than economic status, however, Sister Jamesetta pointed out. "Some children are handicapped by extremely difficult home situations. These are 'disadvantaged' children too, and could be eligible for our program," she explained.

At Our House® Easy-Does-It

How to Teach Your Baby to Read, recent book by Glenn Doman, not only spells out for parents the how-to of instruction in reading for pre-schoolers, but, by innumerable, presupposes an intense interest in your child and his early development.

This is not a review of the book; that is for another department of the paper. We should like to comment on only one facet of Author Doman's text, a theory we have long held at our house. That is to talk to your children, talk to them from the first time you are introduced, build up a camaraderie long before they can respond even with visible signs of recognition.

As Mr. Doman points out, by the time a child is ready for school, he has built a whole language. That facility in his native tongue can be acquired mainly by osmosis, a heritage learning to use his tongue without thinking about it, just as he walks without a conscious "heel-toe" technique.

Teach that toddler to read if you want to, but best of all, talk to him, not at him. Use the best English you know, but don't worry too much about grammar, sentence structure and all the "bookish" part of it. Just give him flexibility of tongue with an easy-does-it approach.

If you're a bi-lingual, or tri-lingual home, that tot is doubly or trebly blessed! He can, without strain, as a pre-

schooler, pick up a second or even a third language from an Italian, German, French, or other foreign-speaking parent or grandparent. He can thus gain a facility of tongue unattainable later on from difficult, expensive high school or college language courses.

These are the precious years, the period of rapid growth in learning. Whatever you speak, at your house, keep speaking it to your children, encourage not only language flexibility but intra-family communication.

An example of the incongruities in our own English, the subtle humor of which can be savored only by one thoroughly familiar with the language, is caught in the subjoined verse, author unknown, at least to this columnist. Try it out on your growing youngsters. Read it slowly and see at what age they find it funny. Bet you'll be surprised!
