A Nazareth College senior has been awarded a coveted Woodrow Wilson Fellowship and two other members of her class have received an honorable mention citations from the same foundation.

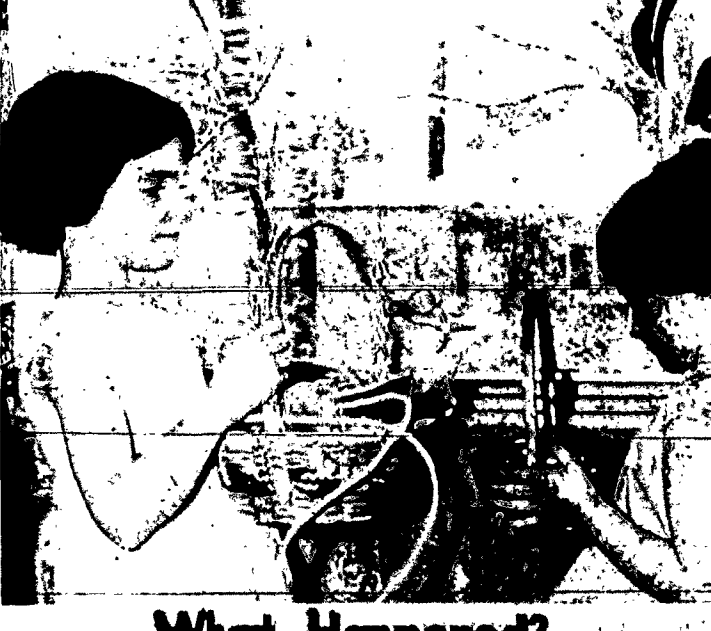
All three girls have just returned from a special study of Oxford University in England and were interviewed for the Woodrow Wilson Fellowship

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Negroes Said Skeptical
Newark, N. J. — (NC) — Negro buyers for homes in suburban communities opening up to intergrated housing.
