A sharing of their knowledge by noted specialists will highlight the biennial convention of the Council of Catholic Women, Saturday, April 24, at Bishop Kearney High School, on Kings Highway, Irondequoit.

An 8:30 a.m. registration in the Kearney Foyer opens the day-long meeting. Coffee and donuts will be served simultaneously in the gymnasium exhibit hall. A dialogue Mass, celebrated by the Most Rev. Lawrence B. Casey, D.D., follows at 9:30 a.m. Bishop Casey will address the delegates at the end of the Mass.

Dr. Peter Muirhead, assoc-

iate commissioner of the United States Office of Education, will explore the topic, "Federal Interest in Education," in the principal address.

The "Three Faces of Woman" will be presented by Dr. E. T. McDonough, local obstetrician and gynecologist, Dr. David Macyle, Assistant Director of the Court Psychiatric Clinic and instructor in Psychiatry at the University of Rochester Medical School, and Rt. Rev. Msgr. Arthur Ratican, former director of the Catholic Family Center.

Very Rev. Bertin Roll, O.S.M., Cap., National Director General of the Archconfraternity of Christian Mothers, in his workshop, will discuss the attitudes which comprise the most complex of beings — a modern woman!

The international scene will be represented by Anthony Uzomba, a Nigerian student of history at Ithaca College, and Romualdo Tadema, instructor from the University of the Philippines, now studying at Cornell. Mr. Uzomba will personalize international relations. Mr. Tadema is a panel member in the workshop on "Ecumenical-Understanding."

The area of human relations will involve Mrs. Sophie Divers, active in Rochester's Urban Renewal program, Mrs. Alma Greene, president of the Catholic Interracial Council, and Mrs. Ronald Gledhill, board member of the Women's Human Relations Council.

Rev. Joseph Geritz, S.J., member of the Board of Directors of St. Martin de Porres Center, will serve as moderator of the workshop on "World Responsibility."
