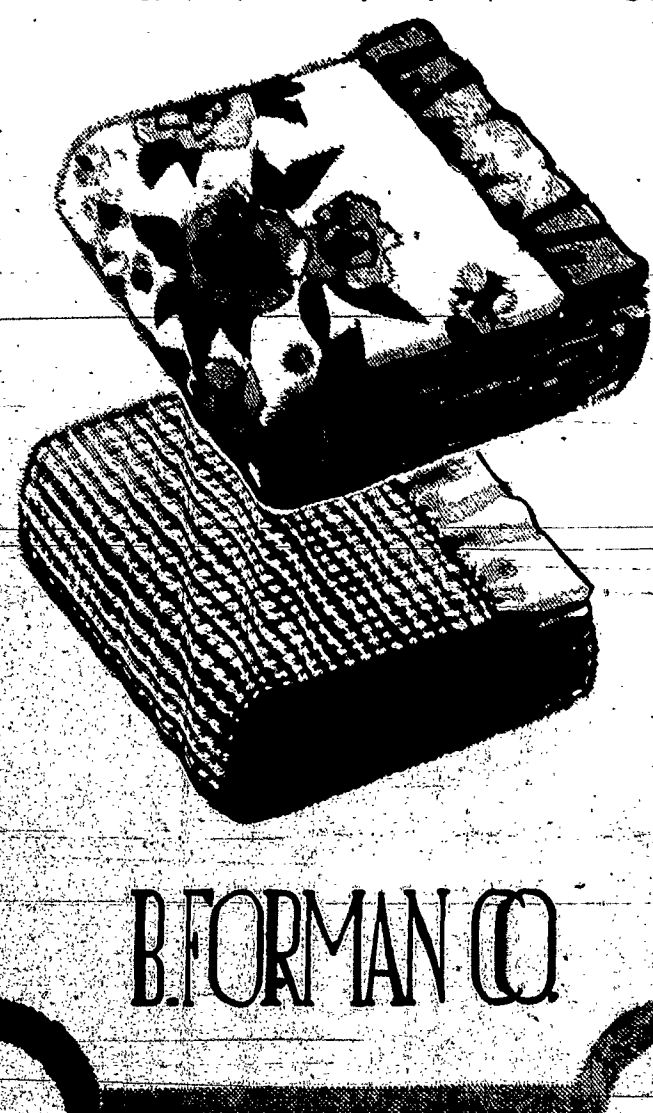

Priests Mark Silver Jubilee

Sixteen priests of the Rochester Diocese will mark their silver jubilees this month.

All but one are members of the 1940 ordination class of St. Bernard's Seminary.

Of the 20 original members of that class, three have died, two were ordained at a different date than their classmates.

The jubilarians are:

Monsignors Charles Boyle, John Maney and Richard Quinn and Fathers Vincent Collins, Joseph Donovan, John Hayes, Joseph F. Hogan, Alfred Horr, Thomas Kane, Bernard Kuchman, John Morgan, John Murphy, William Nolan, Bartholomew Nolan, William Schell, Keril, Albert Shanon, Edward Tolster and George Wood.

Deceased members of the class are Fathers Joseph McCarthy, Michael O'Brien and Wallace VanDusen.

Following are details of jubilee observances and brief biographies of the priests:

MONSIGNOR BOYLE, pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church, Humboldt St., Rochester, will celebrate his jubilee Mass at the parish church Sunday, May 16, at 12:30 noon. Bishop Kearney will preach the sermon.

A reception will be held in the parish hall that afternoon from 4 to 6 p.m.

In his six years as pastor at St. John's, he has supervised construction of an all-new school and served as a member of the Diocesan Building Commission.

He was born Dec. 18, 1911, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles J. Boyle in The Bronx, New York. He attended All Saints Preparatory School, Fordham University and Kenrick Seminary.

He was ordained by Bishop Kearney at Sacred Heart Cathedral May 18, 1940 and was appointed assistant pastor at Immaculate Conception Church, Rochester. As curate there he also directed the weekly Catholic Courier newscast on radio station WHAM and was an instructor at St. Mary's School of Nursing.

He was transferred to be assistant pastor at Our Lady of Good Counsel Church in 1944 and also served as a faculty member at Nazareth College.

Monsignor Boyle then began his 15 year association with the diocesan educational program by being named assistant superintendent of schools in 1945 and superintendent in 1953. During this time he also taught at St. Andrew's Seminary and, while doing graduate studies, at Fordham University.

Pope Pius XII named him a domestic prelate in 1948. He began his present pastorate June 30, 1959.

MONSIGNOR MANEY, pastor of Corpus Christi Church, Rochester, celebrated his jubilee Mass last July 30 for the priests of the Diocese and August 2 for parishioners and other laymen. A reception was held on the later date in the parish hall. Bishop Kearney presided and preached at both Masses.

Besides the title of Monsignor, the jubilarian holds the title of Protolator Apostolic. He served as both Vicar General and Chancellor of the Rochester Diocese.

A Geneva native, Monsignor Maney is the son of Mrs. John A. Maney and the late Mr.

FATHER DONOVAN, pastor of St. Mark's Church, Rochester, will mark his jubilee with Mass on May 16 at 4 p.m. in the parish church. A reception will follow at Cardinal Mooney High School from 5 to 7 p.m.

Father was born in Rochester July 12, 1914, the son of Mr. Mortimer F. Donovan and the late Hannah Donovan. He attended Immaculate Conception School and St. Monica's School, Rochester; St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries. He was ordained in Sacred Heart Cathedral by Bishop Kearney on May 18, 1940.

Father Donovan received a master's degree from St. Bonaventure University in 1943 and a doctorate in education from the University of Buffalo in 1952.

His appointments as assistant pastor include St. Paul's, Clifton, N.J.; St. Ann's, Hornell; St. Margaret Mary's, Rochester; St. Patrick's, Corning; St. Peter and Paul, and Holy Rosary, Rochester. He was named pastor of the newly established St. Mark's last year.

He is a graduate of Immaculate Conception School, Aquinas Institute, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries. Monsignor received his master's degree from Canisius College, Buffalo, and took advanced studies at Columbia University and the University of Ottawa.

He was ordained by Bishop Kearney in Sacred Heart Cathedral on May 10, 1940.

Monsignor served as assistant pastor at St. Cecilia, Rockaway, N.J.; St. Mary's, Denville, N.J.; St. Nicholas, Passaic, N.J., and served as spiritual director at Plus XII Memorial High School, Passaic, N.J. He served at Holy Cross, Rochester, and on the staff of the seminary before being named rector.

FATHER COLLINS, pastor of St. Mary's Church, Rexville, and St. Joachim's Church, Canastota, will celebrate his jubilee Mass at the Rexville church Sunday, May 16 at 12 noon. The Rev. James P. Collins, his brother, will preach the sermon.

A reception will be held in Somers Hall, Canastota from 2 to 4 p.m.

Father Collins was appointed pastor of the Rexville and Canastota parishes in 1963.

Son of Mrs. Vincent A. Collins and the late Mr. Collins, the jubilarian was born March 15, 1915 in Rochester. He attended Immaculate Conception School, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries.

He was ordained by Bishop Kearney at Sacred Heart Cathedral on May 18, 1940.

Father Hayes has served as assistant pastor at St. Anthony's, Sacred Heart Cathedral, St. Augustine's and Our Lady of Lourdes, Rochester. He was chaplain at Veterans Administration Hospital in Bath for five years and a U.S. Army chaplain during World War II.

In the army, Father Hayes held the rank of major. He was attached to General Patton's famed Third Army which engaged in campaigns of Northern France, Rhineland, Ardennes and Central Europe. His decorations include the Bronze Star Medal for Heroic Achievement, European Campaign Medal and others. He authored a history of the 183rd Field Artillery group for which he received a letter of commendation from General Patton.

As chaplain at Bath, Father Hayes designed and directed the building of Company II Chapel for blind and paraplegic patients. He is a member of the Neuropsychiatric Rehabilitation Board of Veterans Hospital.

Since his appointment to St. Patrick's in 1963, Father has completed renovation of the school, extension of the parish

center ad parking area. He directed an Increased Revenue Campaign which resulted in many improvements to the church and school.

Father Hayes is a member of the Board of Directors of the Visiting Nurses Association and the Catholic Family Service.

FATHER HOGAN, pastor of St. Vincent de Paul Church, Corning, will offer his jubilee Mass at the parish church Sunday, May 30 at 12:15 noon. Sermon will be preached by the Very Rev. Joseph L. Hogan.

A reception will be held on Sunday, May 16 in St. Vincent's School Hall from 3 to 5:30 p.m.

A native of Waverly, Father Hogan was born April 3, 1913. He is the son of Mrs. Frank E. Hogan and the late Mr. Hogan. He is a graduate of Waverly High School, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries. He was appointed pastor of St. Vincent's in 1964.

Ordained by Bishop Kearney at Sacred Heart Cathedral on May 18, 1940, Father Hogan was assigned assistant pastor at St. Michael's, Penn Yan and St. Andrew's, Dundee. He also served in this capacity at St. Pat-

**Prelate Describes
Church's Duty
In Southern U.S.**

Macon, Ga.—(RNS)—Archbishop Paul J. Hallinan of Atlanta said here the Catholic Church has a "new role" to play in the South in leading the fight against

discrimination and hate groups, in fostering Christian unity and in aiding the poor.

Addressing the Savannah Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, he said that as a result of the Second Vatican Council the "whole world is watching Catholicism," and this behooves Catholics to make greater efforts in contributing to the South's religious, cultural and social development.

In the South today, the prelate said, the Ku Klux Klan and "their collateral cousins who scorn Jews, resent Catholics and oppress Negroes are in agony" because these so-called minority groups are losing their "minority traits."

"The hate groups, long used to thinking of Jews, Negroes and Catholics as aliens and outsiders—find themselves frustrated to the point of fever and agonized to the point of violence," he said.

He urged "laws to restrain this violence" and a "stronger public opinion to nullify their efforts." At the same time, he said, Catholics should pray for them because "they are often sick people and like Christ's persecutors 'they know not what they do.'"

In speaking of Christian unity, Archbishop Hallinan said that while Catholics in the South have maintained a "wide and honest fellowship" with their fellow Christians, this fellowship must now be nourished in the new climate of ecumenical understanding, enlivened by prayer and given common tasks to do in the public welfare.
