





This good woman reminds us of the one who made an offering in the Temple while Our Lord watched. He watched all who gave, and noted in particular a woman who gave only two small coins. When He said that her gift was worth more than all the others, He was judging not by what people gave but by what they had left. The gift of \$40 from California represents not just that much more material help for the Missions but an immensurable amount of leve, because it was a sacrifice that left little behind for self.

We believe that the Missions are helped not only by the gift but also by the love with which it was given. When a woman on the road touched the hem of Our Lord's garment He said, "I feel power go out from Me." It is this same power of love that goes out from the good woman in California.
