Very recently a woman came to a California rectory with a gift. She told the priest who opened the door, "This is for Bishop Sheen to help him feed the poor of the world and cure lepers. I can get along without new clothes... There are so many people who have nothing in this world."

Who is this woman and what is her background? She is married, but her husband had a heart attack five years ago and since then has been unable to work. So at the age of 57, she supports them both by cleaning banks and offices after working hours. She took this job (leaving a good one in a hospital) so that her husband would not be alone for eight hours a day. Every night he accompanies her to work and stays with her, keeping her company until she has finished.

This good woman reminds us of the one who made an offering in the Temple while Our Lord watched. He watched all who gave, and noted in particular a woman who gave only two small coins. When He said that her gift was worth more than all the others, He was judging not by what people gave but by what they had left. The gift of \$40 from California represents not just that much more material help for the Missions but an immeasurable amount of love, because it was a sacrifice that left little behind for self.

We believe that the Missions are helped not only by the gift but also by the love with which it was given. When a woman on the road touched the hem of Our Lord's garment He said, "I feel power go out from Me." It is this same power of love that goes out from the good woman in California. It helps to heal the sick and needy and, we trust, edifies you. Without doubt it will inspire some to be equally wholehearted in their sacrifices so that those in mission lands can share our living faith.

A \$109 MILLION PROGRAM FOR IMPROVEMENTS IN 1965

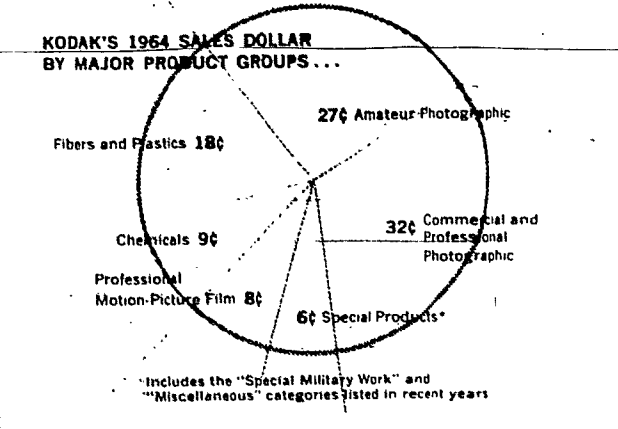

TRENDS IN THE BUSINESS

Over the past ten-year interval, the percentage gain in Kodak sales, adjusted for changes in the company's selling prices has been about double the gain in Gross National Product, adjusted for price changes.

All Kodak's earliest products were related to picture-taking. Although photographic markets still account for the major part of the business, Kodak has diversified greatly over the years. Today, about one-third of sales are of other products—such as fibers, plastics, vitamins, and industrial chemicals—which serve the needs of a growing variety of customers.

Tens of thousands of people in Monroe County have important supporting roles in our business progress. For example, there are more than 22,000 Kodak share owners in the local area. Last year alone they received some \$2.5 million in dividends on their investment in the company.
