Aquinas-St. Brendan Benefit Debate Set

Aquinas debaters will match forensic talents against St. Brendan Girls' High School of Brooklynp in order to raise \$1000 to send their State Championship varsity debate team to the National Catholic Speech Tourney in New York City and to the National Speech Finals in Omaha.

The benefit debate on "Control of Nuclear Weapons By an International Organization" will be at the Aquinas Auditorium on Saturday, June 5, at 8:15 p.m. St. Brendan's will take the affirmative and Aquinas the negative. Tickets are being sold for \$1 by Aquinas alumni, members of the Rochester Optimist Club and Aquinas students.

Both schools have qualified for the National Finals June 22 - June 25 in Omaha, Nebraska by winning State League titles.

St. Brendan's coach, John Sexton, a graduate student in theology at Fordham University, has a two-student debate team of Terry Keeley and Regina Crea who have won first places at Fordham University and Seton Hall College. In the Queens-Brooklyn Diocese they are undefeated in league debate having won seventy-two and lost none.

Aquinas, with the most successful forensic program in Rochester high school history, has won 90% of all varsity encounters having taken first place at Brockport, Canisius College, Mt. Saint Mary's of Buffalo and Hamilton College besides the New York district title.

Coach Gordon J. DeHond has four top varsity debaters in the persons of Jim Hendricks, Tom Farrell, Bob Craig and Dave Hill. The Hill-Craig team will represent the Rochester diocese in the Catholic Finals in New York City Memorial Day weekend while the Farrell-Hendrick team will represent New York State in the National Forensic Finals at Omaha in mid-June.

Both schools have met a total of six times with three wins each. Both schools are matched at the National Catholic Speech Finals on May 28 in New York City for what will be a preview to the following weekend exhibition debate.
