Kings Tame Mooney 9

In two fields of athletic activity, Bishop Kearney bested archrival Cardinal Mooney. On the baseball field, the Kings, behind a magnificent four-hit performance by Rip Coleman, topped the Cardinals 6-1, and in track, the Kings rolled to a 60-43 triumph.

On Sunday, at Red Wing Stadium, the victors scored first. A triple by Don Monacelli and a squeeze bunt by Al Ozminowski plated a run. The Cardinals knotted the count with a tally scored on a walk to Jim Butler, an infield hit, and a double by Bill Walker.

The threat of a further scoring thrust ended as Kevin Dugan bounced out to third and Joe Tortorelli was out trying to score on Dugan's ground-er. The Kings broke the tie in the fourth on a single by Coleman, an error, and a double by Ozminowski. A balk by Butler plated another run. In the sixth inning, a single by Don Monacelli, a stolen base, and a single by Mike Arena gave the Kings a 4-1 lead, and they added two in the seventh as Dave Zughofer lined out a two-run single.

Coleman, who had been in trouble in the early innings, got hotter as the game went along. He fanned 12 and gave up only one hit in the last five innings. Aside from the hits by Terry Murphy and Bill Walker, no balls were hit out of the infield by the losers as Coleman was the master of the situation.

The win puts the Kings record at 8-6, with two of the victories coming at the hands of Mooney. Coleman has now won 5 of 7 decisions.

In the track meet held Tuesday, May 19, at Bishop Kearney, Kearney participants set a number of records. Jim Trost set a county record for the pole vault as he went over the bar at 12 feet 7 inches. School records were broken by Greg Conderacki in the 880 yard run with a clocking of 2:05.9, by Jim Neary in the mile, 4:54.5, by Bill Morris with a 20 foot 5 inch measurement in the broad jump, and by John Nuzetko who went 40 feet 5 inches in the triple jump.

Quaid chalked up 22 points for the runner-up position with Webster High third, scoring 16 points. Christian Brothers Academy of Syracuse was fourth with 15 points.

McQuaid's Steve Fahy took the opening leg lead of the sprint medley and his mates, John Carpolletto, Dave Dunn and Chuck Malar, maintained it to win in 3:45.1.

Aquinas' foursome of Randy Block, Don Hall, Craig Zurkey and Mike Gruttadauria set a meet record in the 440 with an excellent clocking of .445. With Bob Donofrio running in place of Gruttadauria, the Aquinas team set a new meet record in the 880 with a timing of 1:32.0. Aquinas' speedy anchorman Craig Zurkey was no match for Webster's Lynn McLymond as the swift, smooth-striding Zurkey finished in a breeze.

Canius of Buffalo established a new mark of 8:00.5 in the distance medley relay while Aquinas, which placed second, also bettered the time set last year by C.B.A.

Vincent Tofany, an Aquinas alumnus and former chairman of the Monroe County Board of Supervisors, presented the trophies to the winning schools.

Rev. John F. Ware, C.S.B., track coach at Aquinas, was meet director. Anthony T. Powderly was chief referee and starter.

Ecumenism is practiced perhaps more in the Missions than anywhere else. Here in our Western world, ecumenism is based upon conversation. In the Missions it is based upon action. And this action is in the form of human service. For example, in one of our mission hospitals, 7,853 outpatients were treated in one year. Of these, 6,652 were Hindus and Moslems. Only 10 per cent were Catholics. (And this is a Catholic hospital!) Some of these patients come from 300 miles away. Last year, 674 major operations were performed and 1,040 babies were delivered. In the space of these three months there were 570 eye operations and over 5,000 eye patients were treated. All this is accomplished in over-crowded, inadequate buildings by a handful of medical missionary sisters and a few doctors.

Priests! What the price of your golf clubs would mean to these sisters! Catholic mothers! Have you ever asked a son or daughter to give up a soft drink a week to help the sick and suffering on the other side of the world? Business men! Did you ever promise to give a dollar a week to the Holy Father to keep these hospitals open? You who are getting fat! Did you ever think of giving up that dessert and sending the price of it to help the Holy Father feed someone who is starving? You who are getting old! Did you remember the Holy Father in your will? What you leave after you, then will gain intercessors on earth for your soul if it's in purgatory. You who live on a fixed income! Have you thought of reducing your taxes by taking out an annuity, so that you live on the same income and at your death your money will go to the poor of the world who will pray for you? There is no reader of this column who could not send a dime to help their brothers in every party of the world. But WILL you?

"GOD LOVE YOU to a 'boy in Michigan' for \$5 'This is money that I can easily do without.' ... to Mr. and Mrs. F.R. who sent \$3 'because our children are healthy.' ... to a woman who could spare her diamond ring 'May this small token when sold, buy food for starving bodies and perhaps help a missionary to touch a starving soul.'"

Do you know what the 30th parallel is? It is an imaginary line that girdles the globe. Below it are Central and South America, Oceania, India, half of China, most of Africa. Above it are the well-endowed, the well-fed; those below live and die in wretchedness. Those above cannot envision the horror and anguish of those below. Hunger is not merely an economic problem; it is a moral and spiritual one - a greater danger to our future than atomic warfare. It is around this searing theme that Bishop Sheen has fashioned his new movie, "The 30th Parallel." It runs 26 minutes and is available through your local Diocesan Director.
