Funeral Held For N.Y. Priest

The 43-year old secretary to Cardinal Spellman, Monsignor Vincent Kennedy, died Thursday, May 20, 1965. Prior to his appointment as secretary he had been an army chaplain and a member of the archdiocesan mission band.

Born in New Rochelle, he was ordained in 1947, served a curate at Mt. Carmel Church, Elmford, and St. Frances of Rome Church in the Bronx and as a teacher at Cardinal Hayes High School. After three years as a chaplain in the U.S. Army and four years with the mission band, he became business manager of St. Joseph's Seminary, Yonkers.

A 1964 Nazareth College graduate has been named a Peace Corps Volunteer after completing three months of intensive training at the University of California.

Monika Wickert, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen P. Wickert, 91 Westlodge Ave., left May 22 for Peace Corps service in India.

This group of volunteers, which includes post-war workers and students, will be engaged in the Peace Corps agricultural and health efforts in India. Of the 280 volunteers now serving in India and the 200 now in training for service in the Asian nation, over half are engaged in agriculture and rural community development. Other volunteers in India are secondary school teachers and public health workers.

In training, the new Volunteers studied the history, culture and customs of India. They learned one of several different languages, depending on their assignment in the sub-continent. Poultry workers studied Hindi, Kannada or Malayalam and the nutritionists learned Telegu.

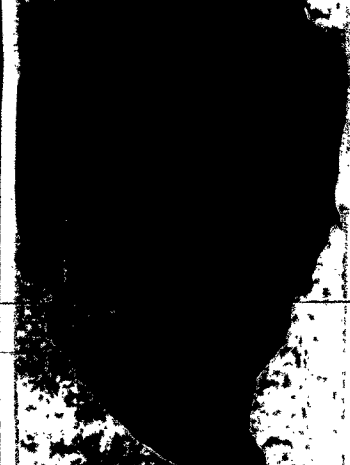

Nun, Brother of Hero To Christen Destroyer

Boston — (RNS) — A new Navy destroyer escort, the U.S.S. O'Callahan, has been named for a famed World War II chaplain. In September, it will be christened by a nun — sister of the man for whom the craft takes its name.

The Navy's christening ceremony will be held at Bay City, Mich. — and it will honor the late Father Joseph T. O'Callahan, S.J., the only chaplain in U.S. history to win the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Sister Rose Marie, M.M., will substitute for her mother Mrs. Alice Casey O'Callahan, 92, and now residing in a Worcester, Mass., nursing home. To her will fall the honor of christening a ship named for her brother.

For Alice (Sister Rose Marie) and Joseph O'Callahan World War II brought much travail, suffering and honor. The priest, after World War II, knew only ill health the rest of his life. And his sister, the nun, stationed in the Philippines, was imprisoned by the Japanese.

Father O'Callahan, who held the rank of lieutenant commander in the Navy Chaplaincy Corps, won his Medal of Honor for heroism aboard the aircraft carrier Franklin on March 19, 1945, when the great ship was turned into an inferno by Japanese dive bombers.

His Medal of Honor citation reads in part: "Calmly braving the perilous barriers of flame and twisted metal to aid his men and his ship, Lt. Cmdr. O'Callahan groped his way through smoke-filled corridors to the open flight deck and into the midst of violently exploding bombs. . . . He ministered to the wounded and dying, comforting and encouraging men of his faith; he organized and led firefighting crews; he led the blazing inferno on the flight deck; he directed the jettisoning of live ammunition and the flooding of the magazine; he manned a hose to cool hot, armed bombs rolling dangerously on the flight deck, continuing his efforts despite searing, suffocating smoke which forced men to fall back . . ."

Native of Rochester Rev. Louis Bauman, Redemptorist, Dies

Solemn Requiem Mass for Father Louis Bauman, C.S.S.R., native of Rochester, was offered on Wednesday, May 26, 1965 in the Church of the Most Holy Redemptor, New York City. Father Bauman, who was 58 years old, died on Saturday, May 22, 1965.

Locally, a Solemn Requiem Mass will be celebrated for the repose of his soul on Saturday, May 29, at 8 a.m. in St. Joseph's Church on Franklin St.

Son of the late Francis X. and Mary Edelman Bauman, the Redemptorist priest attended Our Lady of Perpetual Help school here, St. Mary's Preparatory College of the Redemptorist Fathers in North East, Pa., and Mount St. Alphonsus Seminary, Saopus, N.Y.

Ordained in 1936, Father Bauman was first assigned to the missions of Brazil, where he labored for 12 years. For a time during World War II, he was stationed in Rochester, at St. Joseph's Church.

After his Brazilian assignment, the late Redemptorist served as a parish priest in Boston, and then began the work of preaching parish missions. Working out of Bradford, Vt., he preached both English and Portuguese missions in New England, New York and Pennsylvania.

He was engaged on a parish mission when he died.

Father Bauman is survived by

two brothers, Raymond and Frank of Rochester, and two sisters, Mrs. James Sutherland of Rochester and Mrs. Patrick Tully of Florida.

Fr. Waytowich To Be Ordained, First Mass Set

Father William J. Waytowich, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Waytowich of 87 Cedar Grove Drive, Rochester, will be ordained a priest of the Diocese of Albany on Saturday, May 29 in Immaculate Conception Cathedral, Albany. Bishop William A. Scully will be the ordaining prelate.

Presbyterians Hear Prelate

Columbus — (RNS) — The road to Christian unity is "long, hard and difficult but . . . not impossible," Roman Catholic Bishop John J. Carberry of Columbus declared as he addressed the 177th General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. here.

Given standing ovations by the 835 commissioners (official delegates) and many visitors at both his arrival and the conclusion of his talk, the bishop called for "prayer, sacrifice, mutual cooperation and respect" among the Churches.

An "abiding patience and trust in the goodness of God and the marvels of Divine presence," he said, "are the great means which will help those who seek to travel along this (ecumenical) way."

Bishop Carberry expressed "sentiments of profound joy and gratitude at the opportunity to bring 'prayerful good wishes' to the United Presbyterian gathering from his entire diocese."

In a discussion of the Second Vatican Council the prelate said the Catholic Church has experienced "profound renewal in many areas, but especially in the field of ecumenism." He said one of his "great joys" at Vatican II came from the presence of Protestant and Orthodox observers who daily "joined with us in a spirit of prayer and hope."

Father Regis Carmelite Plans European Tour

Father Regis Brodzewski, O.Carm., professor at Mount Carmel High School, Auburn, will lead a pilgrimage to the shrines of Europe this summer. The announcement was made recently by the Carmelite Order which sponsors annual pilgrimages to Europe and the Holy Land. This tour will extend from July 12 through August 2.

Most of Europe's great shrines will be visited by the pilgrims, including Lourdes, Fatima and Rome. The highlight of the trip will be an audience with Pope Paul VI. There will also be visits to England, Ireland and Spain.

The special feature of this tour will be a weekend at the ancient motherhouse of the Carmelite Order in Kent, England. The monastery was confiscated in the 16th century by King Henry VIII. In 1951 it was purchased by the Carmelites and has been under renovation since then. This year the great monastery of the Middle Ages will be re-dedicated.

There will be a special visit to the home of the Little Flower, St. Therese, at Lisieux in France, another famous Carmelite shrine.
