Rites Held for Mr. Casey, Father of Auxiliary Bishop

Bishop Kearney, 25 Monsignors, 152 other priests including representatives of religious orders and also lay Brothers attended the Solemn Pontifical Mass for Joseph L. Casey, father of Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Wednesday, May 26. Scores of nuns and lay people also attended the Mass.

Bishop Casey celebrated the Mass assisted by Rev. Philip E. McGhan, deacon, and Rev. Michael C. Hogan, subdeacon. The Absolution was imparted by Bishop Kearney assisted by Rev. James M. Moynihan.

In his talk at the Mass, Bishop Kearney compared the father of a priest to St. Joseph, foster father of our divine Lord. Through a father's labor and love, a Christian homelife nurtures the vocation of a lad to the priesthood, the Bishop said.

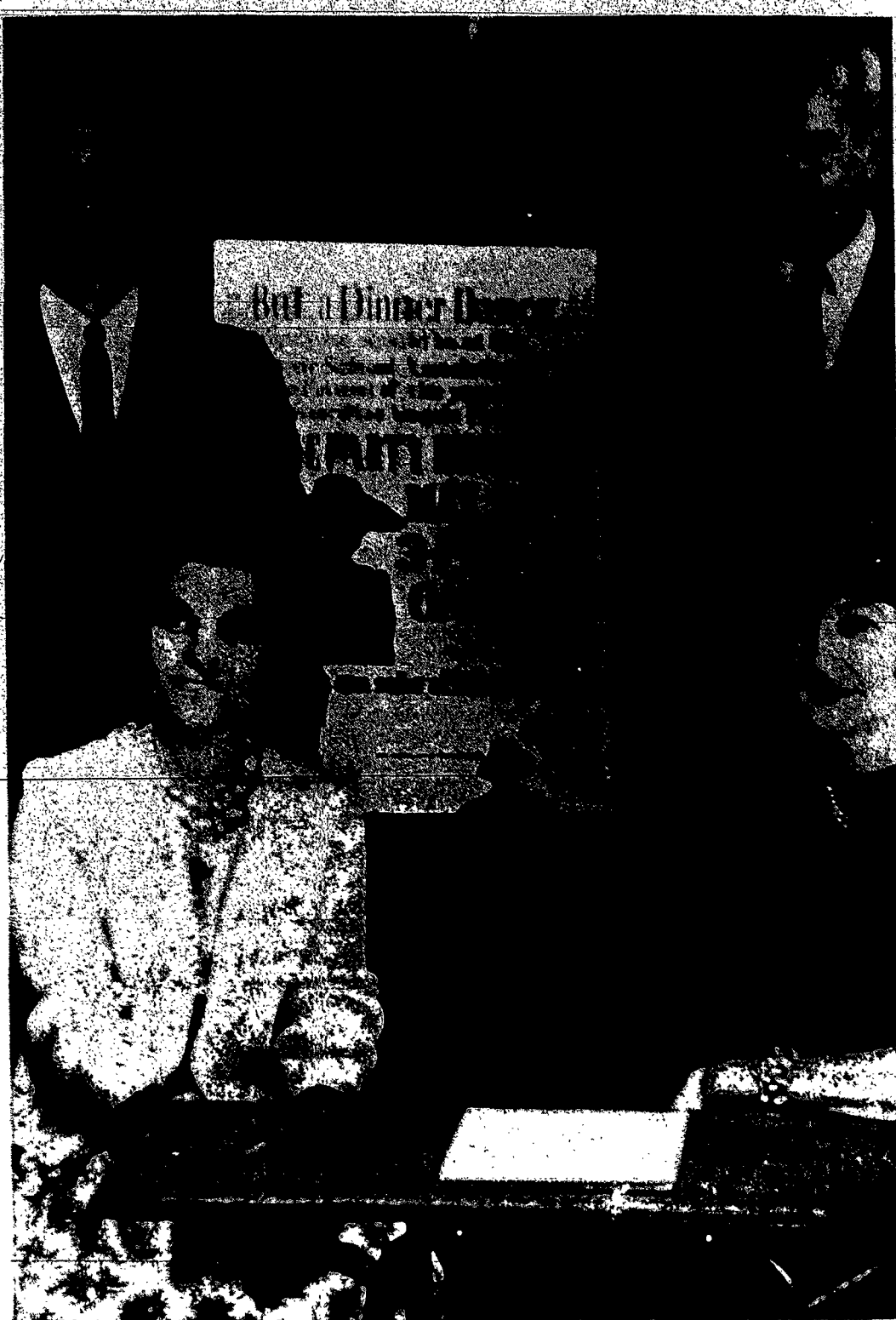

Optimism in Titoland

Belgrade—(NC)—While the Holy See and Yugoslavia's communist regime explore avenues toward diplomatic relations—the Church seeking full freedom to teach and sanctify, and the regime seeking fuller acceptance at home and abroad—Yugoslavia's parish priests are quietly engaged in the struggle for men's souls.

It must be said at the outset that Yugoslavia's laws on religion give the priest more breathing space than laws in other communist countries. And the application of these laws, which depend largely upon the Communist party, has become increasingly more liberal in recent years.

But the Yugoslav priest must work without many of the helps his colleagues of the West use to advantage: schools, clubs, organizations such as the Legion of Mary (which is detested by the communist leaders), libraries and movies. And teachers in the state schools—there are not others—systematically discourage children from attending his catechism classes.

None of the 16 pastors I talked to in Yugoslavia showed signs of bitterness or discouragement at their treatment. Most viewed their work as a challenge, and were on the optimistic side.

Presbyterians Told Go to Mass

Columbus — (NC) — Occasional attendance at Catholic Masses by Presbyterians was urged here in a report of the Commission on Ecumenical Missions and Relations of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.

The report presented to the more than 2,000 Presbyterians attending their church's 177th General Assembly also dealt with reception of Holy Communion at Catholic Masses.

It made clear that Presbyterians "would be well advised not to receive communion in a Roman Catholic church, except when an official invitation is given in terms that are able to be accepted in good conscience."

Priest Speaks On Population

Geneva — (NC) — A Vatican spokesman, appearing at a meeting of the 18th World Health Assembly, declared the Catholic Church is not indifferent to the problems of birth regulation, but he warned that generalizations regarding a solution might do more harm than good.

At the same time, Father Henri de Riedmatten, O.P., suggested that it would be helpful to have an international body to advise nations on population problems. He said such a body should not deal in theory alone but should give scientific advice on practical issues insofar as they come within the realm of science and medical practice.
