Franciscan Third Order To Meet, Set Pilgrimage
The monthly meeting of St. Patrick's Fraternity of the Third Order of St. Francis, which usually occurs on the fourth Sunday of each month, will this month be conducted at 3 p.m. on Sunday, June 13, at St. Patrick's Church, 445 Plymouth Ave. N.

Each Tertiary is asked to consider attendance at the Third Order of St. Francis Convention which opens at the Lord Baltimore Hotel, Baltimore, Md., from Thursday, Oct. 21, to Sunday noon, Oct. 24. The theme of the convention is "Lay Franciscanism—A Dynamic Revival in Christian Thought and Action."

McGuffey's Reader Found In Fisher-Nazareth Course
The introductory reading texts of pioneer American educator William Holmes McGuffey, used by many millions of pupils in this country in the last half of the 19th century, will be found on the reserve shelf for a new course to be offered in the St. John Fisher-Nazareth College 1965 Summer Session.
This course, entitled "Linguistics and the Teaching of Reading in the Elementary School," is tailored to the needs of school teachers and demands no prior linguistics training.
It will be concerned with the interrelationships of spoken and written language, the nature of initial reading problems, and an evaluation of past and current methods of teaching reading in the elementary grades in the light of present linguistic knowledge.
The three-hour credit Fisher summer course, set to meet from 8:30 to 9:45 a.m. Monday through Friday from June 24 to August 4, will be taught by Julian Granberry, associate professor of anthropology and linguistics at St. John Fisher. Granberry has worked in the field of applied English linguistics for the past several years, participating in Federal and State-sponsored research programs in this field. Over the past fourteen years he has taught anthropology and linguistics in universities in Florida, New York State, and Canada.
Granberry states that competence in the use of English is directly proportional to the initial process by which elementary school youngsters are taught to read.
These processes, in turn, are more or less successful according to the understanding the student is given of the relationship between word and written symbol.
In the course he will show which of the initial reading methods now in vogue draw support from linguistic science and which fall short of satisfying linguistic findings.
