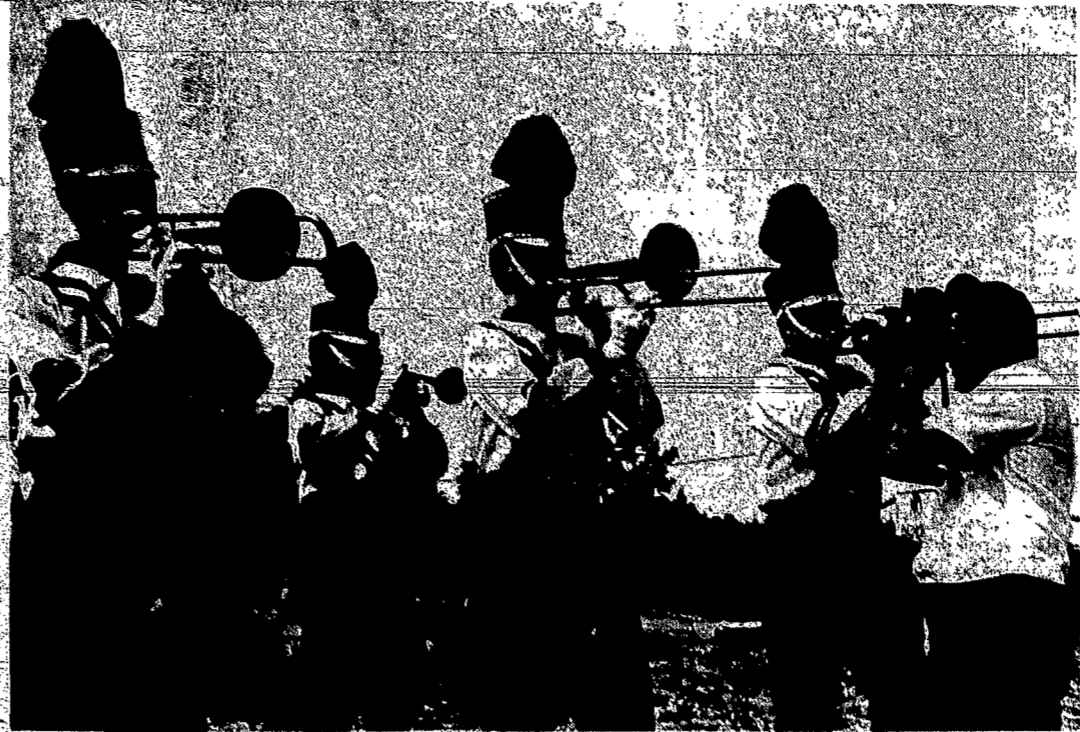

**Town, Country Playhouse
Lists Summer Program**

Starring Joan Fontaine in *The Unexpected Guest*, Town and Country Playhouse will open its sixth season of professional theatre entertainment June 29, at its new location in the air-conditioned East High School Theatre, Culver at Main, Rochester.

In announcing Town and Country's new address, producer Barry C. Tuttle stated that the East High Theatre is especially well-suited for full-scale productions.

The 1500-seat house is small enough to give the intimacy of a New York theatre, yet it provides enough additional seats over the old location in the East Rochester High School that there should be enough to accommodate all ticket seekers.

Tuttle said further that he feels the central location of East High will not only meet with the approval of Town and Country patrons but make professional theater entertainment more accessible to all of greater Rochester. Leaving from Main and Clinton at regular intervals, there will be direct bus service to East High.

With the same format of completely professional productions, starring well-known personalities, the 1965 Town and Country Playhouse season will consist of nine one-week shows, running from June 29 through the week of Aug. 24. There will be eight performances weekly, Tuesday through Sunday nights, with Wednesday and Saturday matinees.
