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International Council CIC Members Enter Family Housing Field

Members of the Catholic Inter-racial Council (CIC) have decided to make a positive, modest, contribution to the low-cost housing shortage in Rochester by buying a house for low-rate rental.

The decision to enter the Family Housing Sponsorship Program as it is termed locally, was made at the June meeting of the CIC held at St. Boniface school hall.

A working committee was chosen to get information on acquiring a house under a non-profit, corporation approach. The committee met on June 23, at Our Lady of Victory Hall, to consult with Robert Corrie of the City Relocation Department, which is ready to advise any group interested in entering the housing field on this basis.

To date, eight Protestant church groups have undertaken the Family Sponsorship program, and have been able to place 8 families — with an average of 10.3 children in each family — in their homes. The entry of the Catholic Inter-racial Council into the field is the first formal venture of a local Catholic group along these lines.

"Victory Housing Foundation" was the name chosen for the Catholic group's corporation. The name was suggested by Father Edward Callens, pastor of Our Lady of Victory Church, who acted as host for the planning meeting of the housing committee.

The following were elected officers of the Victory Housing

Foundation and empowered to take steps to form a legal non-profit corporation for the purpose of acquiring a house:

President, William Archibald; vice-president, Bernard Lancer; and Treasurer, John Trabold.

The newly-elected Archibald made it clear that the motivation of the group is to provide a good home for a low-income family, that the rent taken in would be used to pay off the mortgage and make necessary repairs. Eventually this "self-liquidating" program is expected to pay for the house entirely, but then "any profit accruing would be put to charitable use."

Father Robert Kreckel, moderator of the CIC, expressed the hope that other Catholic groups would investigate this program, and join in. In the meantime, individual Catholics who would like to contribute to the purchase of this first house are invited to send their contributions to:

His first pastorate was at St. John the Evangelist Church, Spencerport, where he served from 1951 to 1953. In 1953, he was appointed to the Canandaigua parish.

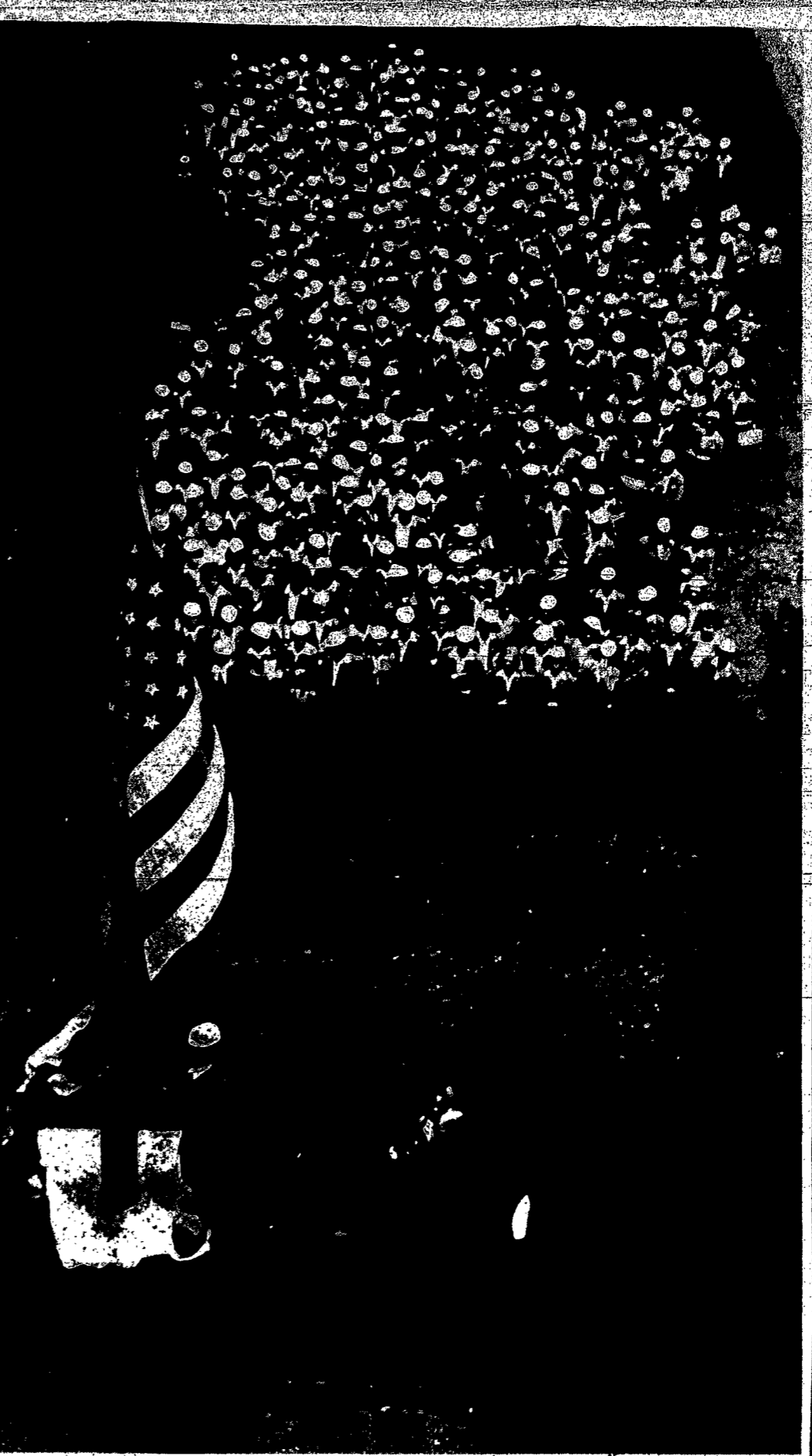
In addition to the priests who served the Mass 18 Monsignori and 100 priests assisted at the solemn Requiem services.
