

High School Graduation Awards

Special awards made to Catholic High School graduates at commencement exercises, as reported by the schools, follow:

McQuaid
The Bishop Kearney Award in honor of St. Francis Xavier was presented to Robert B. Carson at the McQuaid Jesuit High School commencement. Twenty-nine other members of the class received special honors.

Heading the list was valedictorian Mark Sullivan of North Muskegon, Michigan. Sullivan, a resident of Greece until his family moved to Michigan two years ago, received awards for having the highest overall average in religion, Greek, English, history and German. He was also winner of full scholarships to Boston College, Georgetown, Notre Dame, and the Air Force Academy and will attend Georgetown.

The class salutatorian, Richard Rudy, of Irondequoit, received awards for second highest overall average, highest average in French, and excellence in debating. Robert Budic of Webster was the award winner in mathematics and Latin, and Mark Weisskopf of Brighton was the winner in science, receiving the Bausch and Lomb award. All three were also scholarship winners, Rudy at Georgetown and Boston College, Budic at Boston College, and Weisskopf at General Motors Institute.

McQuaid's "Knight of the Year" trophy, voted by the student body, went to Lance Compa of East Rochester, an outstanding student-athlete who was also active in extra-curriculars. Compa also received scholarships to Harvard, Boston College, and Fordham.

Plans include these objectives: for Nazareth, a fine arts structure, to include music and art wings and an auditorium; for St. John Fisher, a science building, a library and a student center.

The Diocese of Rochester proposes to construct and maintain a residence, on property adjacent to the St. John Fisher College campus, for students who plan, after completing their college courses, to continue their education in theology at St. Bernard's Seminary. The cost of the building will be met from part of the funds contributed in the campaign by individuals through the parishes.

First rector of the diocesan residence will be Very Rev. Joseph L. Hogan, S.T.D., who has been a member of the faculty at St. Bernard's since 1955.

Formation of the Joint College Fund Inc., a corporation to handle funds for the building expansion programs at the two colleges, was announced recently. Temporary headquarters for the corporation, and for the campaign, have been established at 140 East Ave., Rochester.

JCF includes representation from the colleges, from the Diocese, and from the community-at-large. Its president is Otto A. Shults, a certified public accountant, who is a member of the board of regents of both Nazareth and St. John Fisher.

Secretary of the corporation is Very Rev. Msgr. George A. Cocuzi, chancellor of the Diocese, Treasurer is Thomas H. Hawks, president of the Rochester Savings Bank.

Selection of top committee chairmen for the autumn campaign has been under way during the last few weeks. Leaders announced to date include:

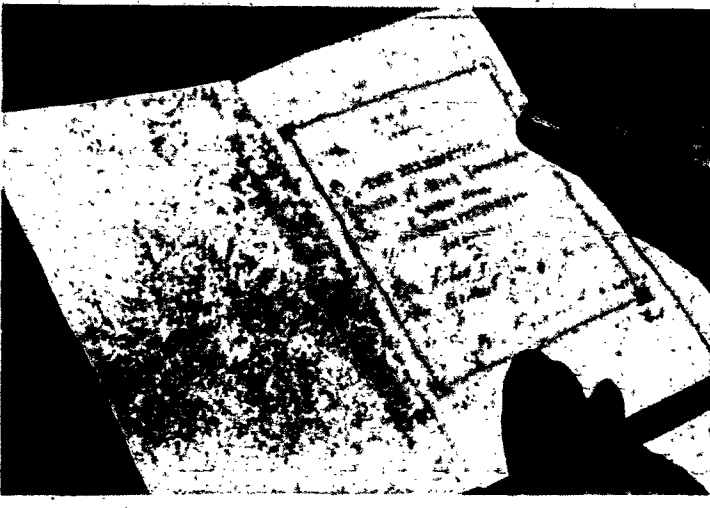

A Book for Bishop's Mother

Nazareth College chaplain Father William Shannon has just returned from a trip to Ireland and England. While on the Emerald Isle he visited Omagh in County Tyrone in North Ireland and the Loreto Convent for Girls where Bishop Kearney's mother attended school.



The nuns at the school presented him a book to bring back to the Bishop, an award given the young scholar Miss Rosina O'Doherty for her proficiency in French. She later donated the book to the school's library before coming to the United States as the bride of William Patrick Kearney.

Father Shannon noted that the award was signed by "Mrs. Shannon." The nuns explained that the latter years of the last century were still times of considerable bigotry against Catholics in that area. Nuns retained their family name and used the title "Mrs." instead of "Sister."

When Bishop Kearney visited the school several years ago on his way to Rome, he wrote the following poem which was printed in the Ulster News:

I have travelled over Europe, Saw its wonders on my way In the noble ruins of the past I wandered day by day. I roamed in paths where saints have trod And heroes played their part, But mid them all, there's just one spot That's pictured on my heart. It is not the lordly castle Famed in story and in song, Nor the dignified cathedral Where the eager pilgrims throng. It is not the stately palace Silent tomb of kingly rule, 'Tis the little Irish convent Where my mother went to school. I have climbed the snow-capped mountain, I have roamed the valleys green, On the fairy wings of memory I visit each fair scene, But fond memory will tarry When one picture I recall, There to dwell in sweet contentment.

On the dearest scene of all, It is not the lordly castle Famed in story and in song, Nor the dignified cathedral Where the eager pilgrims throng, It is not the stately palace Silent tomb of kingly rule, 'Tis the little Irish convent Where my mother went to school.
