



Palmyra Scout Cited, Saved Infant's Life

Sixty-eight members of the Boy Scouts of America were recently cited by the National Court of Honor of that group, for saving a life or for some other meritorious action.

Most of those honored are boys in their teens, who, "forgetful of self, acted with courage and resourcefulness when the emergency came," a scout spokesman explained.

One of the 68 being honored is local Sea Explorer David Seadeck, age 16, of Ship No. 96 of 328 W. Main St., Palmyra. He is to receive the Certificate of Merit it was announced last week by John Rolfe, Scout Executive of the Finger Lakes Council.

The citation accompanying this honor is as follows:

"On July 2, 1964, Sea Explorer David Seadeck of Palmyra, N.Y., found thirteen-month-old Craig Harvey turning blue, showing no signs of breathing, and with his eyes fixed in a constant stare. He slapped the child on the back, trying to make him breathe, but without success. David then laid the child on the dining room table and used the back-pressure artificial method of artificial respira-

tion. The victim started to breathe shortly after and regained his normal color.

"There was no question that without the quick and cool-headed action of this young man, trained with the skill and knowledge of what to do in an emergency, there would have been a very sad ending to this event."

Program For Retarded Included By Chest

William J. Caufield's Funeral Mass Offered

Solemn Funeral Mass for William J. Caufield, active Catholic layman and widely known businessman was offered in St. Monica's Church, Monday, June 28. Mr. Caufield, 76, died June 24, 1965 at St. Mary's Hospital.

The Solemn Requiem Mass was offered by Msgr. Gerald C. Lambert assisted by Rev. Joseph A. Cirincione, deacon and Rev. William Sisson, subdeacon.

Also in the sanctuary were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John M. Ball, V.F. and Reverend Fathers Donald L. Dunn, Walter J. Kohl, Harold H. Rogers, Paul McCabe, and William Donnelly. Four of Mr. Caufield's nephews were among the bearers.

MR. CAUFIELD was a member of St. Monica's Holy Name Society, St. Margaret Mary's Men's Club, Nocturnal Adoration Society, Laymen's Retreat League, First Friday Luncheon Club, Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus and Musa Caravan, Order of the Alhambra.

He was a past president of the Bull's Head Businessmen's Association and had belonged to the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers' Union for many years.

Mr. Caufield attended Immaculate Conception School and was in the first graduating class from St. Monica's School. He was a West High School graduate. He also attended Rochester Free Academy and Mechanics Institute, now Rochester Institute of Technology.

Mr. Caufield was born in the home at 288 Magnolia St. where he resided throughout his life.

After starting his own electrical contracting business in 1914 he bought a hardware store on Brown St. and moved both

businesses to 892 W. Main St. a few years later. He retired in 1947.

Surviving are his wife, the former Mary Greene; two sons, James P. and William E., both of Rochester; two daughters, Mrs. Francis X. Davin of Avon and Miss Helen M. Caufield of Rochester and eight grandchildren.
