## Theologian Dies

### Philanthropist

St. Leo, Fla. — (RNS)—Magr. Roderick MacEachern—Sarasota, Fla., one of the oldest Catholic priests in the U.S., died at 81 on St. Leo's College.

During his lifetime he served the Church and the country as a pastor, educator, author, chaplain, philanthropist, industrialist and rancher.

Although "retired" since 1936, he was active at his death in underwriting a \$5 million expansion program at St. Leo's College which he had previously aided by providing funds for a student building.

Sister Rose Adelaide was the recipient of special recognition by Geneva High School Principal Spurgeon Wuertemberger.

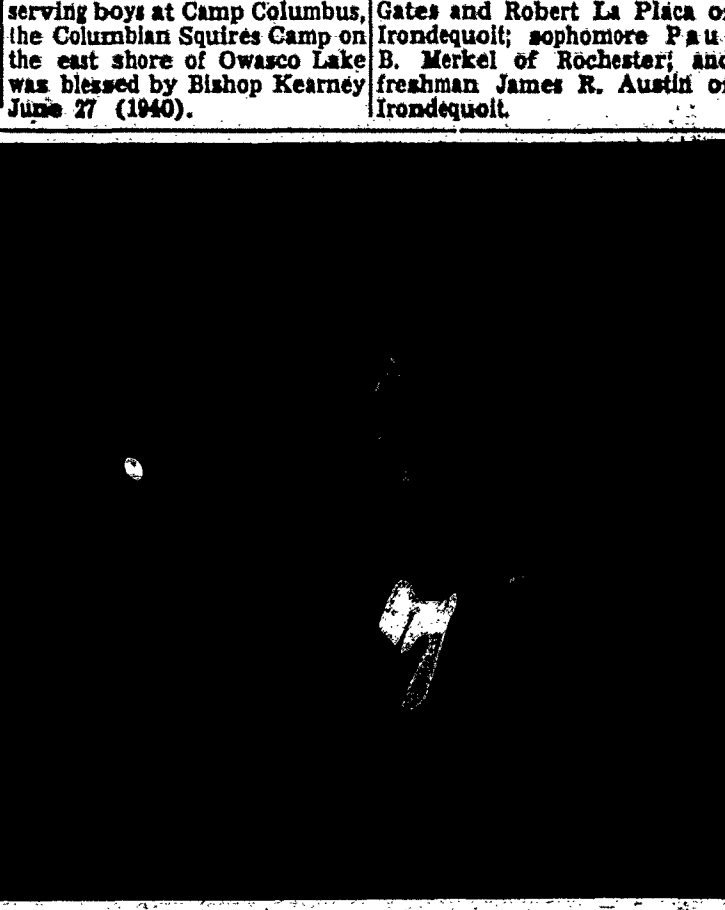
