Philadelphia Prelates Meet

Philadelphia—(NC)—Archbishop John J. Krol of Philadelphia and Archbishop Iakovos of the Greek Orthodox Diocese of North and South America met here and dined together in a historic first at a downtown hotel.

"This is a brotherly meeting," Archbishop Iakovos told newsmen, in the spirit of present-day understanding and working together.

Archbishop Krol commented that it was "a privilege and an honor to meet the archbishop" and he said: "We are both working together under God's command toward the unity of the Church."

The meeting took place at a Greek Orthodox clergy-laity conference. After the two prelates met newsmen and dined together, Archbishop Krol was introduced to delegates at the conference.

To Aid Retarded

New York—(RNS)—New York Catholic Charities' Kennedy Child Study Center and Yeshiva University's Albert Einstein College of Medicine join forces for expansion of research and education programs in child mental retardation. Signing an agreement of affiliation at the Catholic center are Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, and Dr. Samuel B. Belkin, president of Yeshiva, largest and oldest university under Jewish auspices. Standing are Sister Mary Patricia, administrator of the child center; R. Sargent Shriver, director of the Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr., Foundation which has made grants to both the center and medical school; and Mrs. Stephen Smith (the former Jean Kennedy), vice-president of the center's governing board. Cardinal Spellman is the board's president.

**Nation on Brink of Death
Atheism Blamed as Cause**

St. Paul—(NC)—The malignancy of atheism has made American civilization "seriously sick and the illness is probably terminal," Clarence A. Manion, former dean of the University of Notre Dame law school, declared here.

In the keynote address at the first Wanderer Forum, Manion said the three symptoms of "the malignancy that is eating the heart out of our free American institutions" are prevalence of major crimes, communism and the "all but complete collapse of the American constitutional system."

Other speakers at the forum sponsored by the Wanderer, (a strongly conservative) national weekly newspaper published here by Catholics, included Walter L. Matt, editor, and Alphonse J. Matt, business manager, of the Wanderer staff; Eleanor Schlafly, St. Louis; Msgr. Rudolph G. Badas, a Second Vatican Council expert and a pastor here, and Paul Hallett, associate editor of the Denver Register newspapers. Theme of the two-day forum was "The Issue Is Atheism." Some 440 persons from 30 states attended.

"Churches are now substituting social consciousness for the traditional teaching of the faith," he declared. "You can't make a good society of bad men with good laws."

Czech Prelate Worked in Dairy Farm

Vienna—(RNS)—When a group of Western tourists visited a dairy farm in Communist Czechoslovakia recently they were surprised to learn that one of the workers was a Catholic bishop who had been jailed for six years as an "enemy" of the state.

He was, they were informed, Bishop Karel Otčenasek, who at the time of his arrest in 1957—on charges never made public—was serving as Administrator Apostolic of the Diocese of Hradec Kralove in Bohemia.

When he was finally set free in 1963, Bishop Otčenasek was told he could not resume his episcopal office, nor, in fact, function even as a simple priest.

The result was that, in order to support himself, he was forced to seek work on the dairy farm at Nachod in northern Bohemia where, as it happened, he aroused the curiosity of Western tourists.

Now—according to well informed sources here—the bishop, a comparatively youthful 45, has been allowed to shake the dust of the farm from his feet and don clerical robes once more.

He is working as a priest in the village of Trnovec, but is still barred from performing any of the functions of a bishop.

Meanwhile, it was learned

that Czechoslovak authorities also had released a Jesuit priest, Father Frantisek Sihan, who had been jailed in 1950 along with nine other clerics on charges of having worked with the Gestapo during the Nazi occupation, and a Prague seminaryman, Otto Mader, who was sentenced for alleged anti-state activities.

These conciliatory gestures are believed by observers here to stem from recent talks between Czechoslovak and Vatican representatives aimed at stabilizing Church-state relations.
