Anglicans Told Imitate Rome's Self-Criticism
 Winchester — (NC) — A former Roman Catholic monk who is now an Anglican clergyman has called on Anglicans and Protestants to follow the Catholic Church's example of self-criticism.

Canon Amand de Mendota said the agonizing reappraisal of itself the Roman Catholic Church has been conducting for the past three years has been interpreted by most Protestants and Anglicans as a move toward their position.

"As a Christian, I cannot feel quite happy about the general reaction to this new and unexpected situation," he said. "This attitude is both condescending and complacent. It is not at all the fruit of genuine Christian love."

The canon, speaking in the Anglican cathedral here, then said:

"What is called for in answer to this extraordinary and humiliating example which the Roman Catholic Church is so magnificently giving to us, is an equal readiness on our part, Anglicans and Protestants, for a radical self-criticism and for radical changes in our church."

Freedom In Iceland
 Reykjavik — (NC) — The apostolic delegate to the Scandinavian countries said that the Catholic Church here in Iceland is in an excellent position due to Iceland's "atmosphere of freedom and tolerance."

Archbishop Bruno Heim visited Bishop Johannes Gunnarsson and conveyed the good wishes of Pope Paul VI to President Asgeir Asgeirsson in Iceland, the archbishop answered that though Catholics are few, the Church is nevertheless in "a good situation."

He added:

"The atmosphere of freedom and tolerance in which she can develop her work here is worthy of a free people and it is indeed praiseworthy. The Icelandic people are without narrow prejudices and I am pleased by the good will which we meet here. Our work must be unselfish, and in fact, our priests and Sisters are working in hospitals, schools and kindergartens not only for Catholics, but gladly for all who care to request their services."

Pastors at Institute On Ecumenical Gains
 Dubuque — (NC) — A four-year ecumenical dialogue among Protestant and Catholic leaders here resulted in the first Institute of Pastoral Ecumenism, designed to spread the dialogue to the pastoral area.

Since 1961, monthly discussions have been held by the theological faculties of Wartburg Seminary (American Lutheran Church), the University of Dubuque (United Presbyterian), and Aquinas Institute (Dominican House of Theology).

The institute was established to extend the ecumenical movement to area pastors. Approximately 20 Catholic priests and 35 Protestant ministers responded and took part in the institute.

Sessions included addresses by ecumenical authorities, common prayer, group Bible study, and attendance at Catholic, Lutheran, and Presbyterian services.

The opening speaker, Dr. John MacKay, president emeritus of Princeton Theological Seminary, said there are actually two ecumenical movements in the world today. One, he said, is religious and is inspired by the Gospel, while the other is secular and is the result of technological advances which allow increased speed and facility in communication.

Dr. MacKay also said he felt formal religious creeds always will be necessary but he emphasized that sterile belief in a creed is no substitute for wholehearted commitment to Christ.

Other speakers at the institute were Leonard Swidler, co-editor of the Journal of Ecumenical Studies, and the Very Rev. Alexander Schmemmann, dean of St. Vladimir's Orthodox Theological Seminary.
