## Loreto House Backers Form Interracial Guild

Supporters of Hand Street's Loreto House have been busy forming a backers' organization which will channel help to the little neighborhood center in downtown Rochester. The group is called the Loreto Interracial Guild, and each unit is made up of 12 people with a guild captain.

"We wanted to keep the idea of an apostolic project before us," explained Mrs. J. Raymond Hensler, who together with Mrs. Everett E. Murphy, thought up the Guild idea, "and so we decided to limit each unit to 12 members, after the pattern of the Twelve Apostles."

The two women who originated the idea became the first two guild captains, and they have since added 17 more leaders, for a total of 19 guild units. Their goal is 25 guild units with a membership of 300. (At this point, they have nearly 200 members.)

Guild members are asked to donate a dollar a month for a year, and, when available, to help out with some of Loreto House's many projects.

"We want to help meet the most pressing needs of Loreto House," said Mrs. Hensler, "and at this stage, financial help is certainly a prime need. But the Guild will do more than that. We envision it as a means of communication between those directly engaged in the (Loreto House) work and the many people who are interested, and would like to support it in some way."

Miss Josephine Dooley, also a guild captain, has volunteered to be coordinator for the 12 groups, to relay the needs of Loreto House to them and keep them apprised of each other's activities.

Some of the guild members have volunteered to do clerical work at the House, while others have sponsored baptismal parties for children of member families.

New members are invited to an opening personal visit to Loreto House on the last Sunday of each month. Informal Community breakfasts and open houses are other avenues for Guild members to meet parents of children enrolled at the center.

The House recently acquired a new and larger location, a former store building at 469 Clinton Avenue North. Renovation of the new quarters is progressing nicely, according to Isabelle Dolan, founder and director of the House.

## Liturgy Theme Exhibit

Liturgy and Holiness will be the twin themes of the Catholic Information exhibit at this year's Monroe County Fair, which will run from Monday, Aug. 16 to Saturday, Aug. 21, at the Henrietta Rd. grounds. The booth is under the direction of the Legion of Mary, which has staffed the exhibit since its inception several years ago.

Understanding the Liturgy and its relationship to sanctity and union with Christ," describes the overall theme, according to display directors, Alfred DePasqua, James Alessi and Mrs. Alphonse Schell.

The Liturgical renewal, linked with the invitation from recent Popes for Catholic laymen to take an active role in the life of the Church, will provide the material for the colorful exhibit.

A film on the Mass, made recently in Rochester at a local parish, will dramatize congregational participation in the Liturgy.

The story of the Legion of Mary will be shown in a short film entitled, "What is the Legion of Mary?" Colored slides of the various phases of Legion's apostolate will also be screened.

Eye-catching enlargements of photos taken during the Vatican Council will also be on display, at the exhibit, which will be open daily from 11 a.m. daily.

The Catholic Information exhibit is sponsored jointly by the Rochester Community and Rochester-Curia of the Legion of Mary, headed respectively by Edward Adams and Alfred DePasqua.

## Fund Drive Leaders

Selection of additional top committee leaders and the scheduling of pre-campaign meetings highlighted progress this week in the parish phase of the \$9 million Joint College Fund program.

Bishop Kearney and Auxiliary Bishop Casey are slated to address dinner meetings of parish committee moderators, chairmen and secretaries in three diocesan areas during the next fortnight.

Paul A. McGuire, campaign vice-chairman in charge of the parish solicitation division, announced the selection of three regional chairmen. They are:

Region I, Henry J. Kearse, Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Rochester. Kearse heads H. J. Kearse Inc., paving contractors. Region I comprises parishes in Monroe and Livingston Counties and in western Ontario County.

Region II, Francis J. Gormley, Holy Family Church, Auburn. Gormley formerly was associated with the Ashland Oil Co. Region II includes parishes in Cayuga, Wayne, Seneca and Yates Counties and in eastern Ontario County.

Region III, Charles F. Kennedy, St. Patrick's Church, El-

mira. Kennedy is president of Kennedy Valve Manufacturing Co. Region III includes parishes in Chemung, Tioga, Tompkins, Schuyler and Steuben Counties.

Dinner meetings of parish committee leaders, at which the aims and procedures of the autumn campaign will be outlined, are scheduled as follows:

Region I—Tuesday, Aug. 17, 7 p.m., Nazareth College; principal speaker, Bishop Kearney.

Region II—Wednesday, Aug. 18, 7 p.m., Auburn Inn, Auburn; speaker, Bishop Kearney.

Region III—Tuesday, Aug. 24, 7 p.m., Mark Twain Hotel, Elmira; speaker, Bishop Casey.

Funds will be sought throughout the Diocese for expansion of buildings at Nazareth and St. John Fisher Colleges and for construction of a diocesan house of studies adjacent to the St. John Fisher campus.

Robert B. Wegman is general chairman of the multi-faceted drive, to be conducted from September through mid-November. Committees being organized include corporations, business and industry, major gifts, special gifts and alumni and alumnae.

Two gifts to the college fund already have been announced. They are a \$1,440,000 commitment by Xerox Corporation and \$350,000 by the Rochester Gas & Electric Corporation.

## Graduation Rites At McAuley

Dr. Kathrine Koller, Gilmore Professor of English at the University of Rochester, delivered the Commencement Address at the 12th annual Catherine McAuley College graduation exercises, held on the west campus, Tuesday, Aug. 10.

A former president of the National College English Association, and former chairman of the English department at the University of Rochester, she has been a member of the Board of Directors of Lewis Street Center since 1949.

"Behold I set before you an open door, and no man shall

shut it." Quoting St. John from the Book of Revelations, Dr. Koller challenged the graduates to keep their minds open to truth and its meaning in the present moment and also to open doors for others, freeing them for the beauty and joy of living in self-actualization.

She pointed out that education increases our responsibility in making choices and also our "capacity" for delight. "Would rather suffer and know the depth of life than escape all pain."

"The most tragic figures in life to me are the bored, the diffident, and those ignorant of the infinite variety of life, its length, breadth, and depth.
