Auburn Advisory Group Set Up To Study Plans

Auburn — An advisory committee representing parochial and public schools to explore federal and state-aided programs involving "shared services" or "dual enrollments" has been established in Auburn.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. James D. Cuffney, dean of the Cayuga Deanery and pastor of St. Mary's Church and Mrs. Gerard A. Lesch, president of the Auburn Board of Education, announced formation of the committee.

In a prepared statement from Monsignor Cuffney and Mrs. Lesch, it was stated that the purpose of the committee is "to share, develop, explore and study workable understandings of the intent and purposes of federal legislation and state-inspired action involving 'shared services' or 'dual enrollment' for the city's school-age children."

Members of the committee representing the parochial schools are Sister Joseph Gilmary, principal of St. Mary's School; Sister Rose Gertrude, principal of St. Alphonsus School; Rev. Malachy Maloney, principal of Mount Carmel High School and Urban Faubion and Robert Holman, representing the Catholic School Board.

The public schools are represented by Holmes Sullivan, elementary curriculum coordinator; Mrs. Harvey Clark, West High School Librarian; John

Rites for Motor Victims, George and Alice Conway

Funeral Mass for George A. Conway and his wife, Alice Conway was offered in Blessed Sacrament Church, Tuesday, August 17. The couple met their untimely

deaths in a motor crash at Owego on Friday, August 13, 1965.

Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by Monsignor Edward McAniff; Father James Moynihan, deacon, and Father John Phillips.

Final Absolution was given by Bishop Kearney.

The widely esteemed couple had resided at 22 Trowbridge Trail, Pittsford.

Mr. Conway who was Under-sheriff of Monroe County was the only undersheriff to serve under Sheriff Al Skinner who appointed him to the post Jan. 1, 1938. He became a sheriff deputy in 1928 and was promoted to chief deputy in 1936.

Active in veterans circles, Mr. Conway had served as a sergeant with the 108th Infantry in World War I and was gassed during action in France. He was a member of Robert Shaw Post, American Legion.

In Catholic groups, he was a member of the Knights of Equity, Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus and was a past grand commander of Musa Caravan, Order of the Alhambra. He also held memberships in the Elks and Moose.

Mrs. Conway was active in volunteer work at St. Mary's Hospital and was a member of a Seton Branch. She served as president of the Mercy Guild

Sister Cyril Preparing To Tackle Inner City Project

Primed by a summer of intensive preparation at 3 universities, plus field work in the inner-city areas of Chicago and New York, Sister M. Cyril, of the Sisters of St. Joseph, is ready to take up her new work.

She will be a "Diocesan supervisor," assigned to 5 inner-city schools, for work with "educationally deprived" children.

She will spend most of her time in 5 of Rochester's near-downtown schools: St. Bridget's, St. Lucy's, St. Michael's, Our Lady of Mt. Carmel and Immaculate Conception.

"The drastic transformation of many of our city parishes in the last 10 years has resulted in rapidly declining enrollments in our inner city schools," stated Father William M. Roche, superintendent of schools for the Diocese of Rochester, adding that the Diocese sees this as a challenge to be met, rather than a signal to retreat.

"Rather than abandon these facilities and the people who live in these neighborhoods, we have decided to use them for a greatly expanded work, both spiritual and educational."

The Catholic Church has a serious mandate to spend itself on the poor, he stressed, in stating that the Church "looks upon this opportunity to perform a unique service for the good of the entire community."

The program will revolve around special teacher training, special curriculum development and more particular approaches geared to the special needs of the children in this area.

As director of this project, Sister Cyril has been attending special courses and workshops this summer at the University of Chicago, Cornell University and New York University. Field

work in inner-city educational projects has been part of her experience.

No stranger to the inner city, Sister taught at Immaculate Conception school for 8 years and also taught one year in a Negro school in Selma, Alabama, conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph.

Besides curriculum revision and the teacher training listed above, the program envisions greater use of sisters as "home visitors" in the parishes served.

Already, two sisters have been assigned to this work.

Sister M. Regis, R.S.M., has been assigned to Our Lady of Mt. Carmel school and Sister M. James, S.S.J., has been assigned to Immaculate Conception. Two additional nuns are expected to be named soon for the St. Michael's and St. Bridget's parish areas.

Czech Prelate Wants End To Exile

Osolo — (NC) — Cardinal Joseph Beran of Prague said here he wants to return to his homeland as soon as he can get Czechoslovakia's communist regime to give him the necessary special permission.

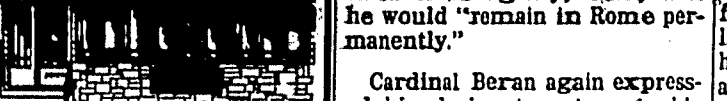
After more than 15 years of internment and restrictions the Czech prelate was allowed to go to Rome on Feb. 19, three days before he was created a cardinal. The cardinal has said he does not want to stay away from Czechoslovakia indefinitely, but shortly after his departure the official Czechoslovakia news agency, OZEK, said he would "remain in Rome permanently."

Cardinal Beran again expressed his desire to return to his native land in a speech given after he laid the cornerstone of a building that is to be part of a Czechoslovak youth camp here.

He also said that Czechoslovak Catholics go to church more than is usually thought in the West. Among the churchgoers, he added, are young people and professionals, such as physicians and engineers who are so important to the government that it cannot forbid them to attend Mass.

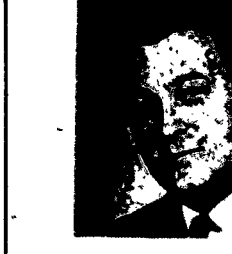
