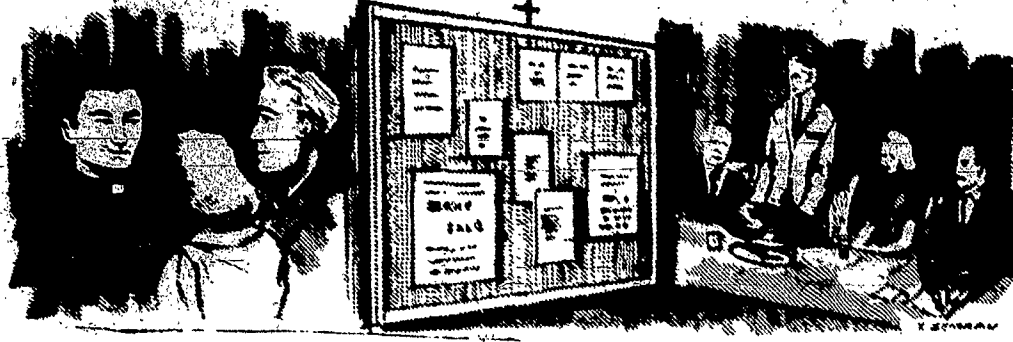

Notre Dame Nuns Moving To Meet Needs of Times
Typical of the adjustment teaching congregations are making to the needs of contemporary society in America is the policy formulated by the School Sisters of Notre Dame meeting in the Northwestern Provincial Motherhouse, Wilton, Connecticut for their 11th annual Educational Conference, August 16-20.
Official delegates meeting with the major superiors of the community, including the Superior General Mother Mary Ambrosia, who had come from Rome for the conference pointed out:
"Culturally deprived students, whether disadvantaged by race, national origin, or poverty, constitute a growing portion of the school population. Their educational needs demand a re-thinking of our educational policy."
After quoting Vice president Hubert H. Humphrey, at the recent White House Conference on Education: "Let all levels of the American educational system — federal, state, and local, public and private — join hands to make slum schools centers of educational excellence in our country," the sisters went on to publish these directives:
1. Schools in deprived areas should adapt their curriculum to the needs and capacity of the pupils. The staff should study the community environment and formulate their philosophy and objectives in view of it.
2. Sisters have an aptitude for work with the underprivileged should be given special training to enable them to understand the people with whom they work to know and value their specific cultural patterns and to be aware of their specific needs, both intellectual and spiritual.
3. In a spirit of love for God's poor, non-Catholic pupils should be welcomed into our schools unless contrary to established diocesan or parochial policy. New life can be infused into these schools, and the level of the life of the community can be raised, if the school accepts the pupils as they are, and trains them in principles of Christian living.
There are 7,000 School Sisters of Notre Dame teaching in 36 states and four provinces of Canada. They conduct schools at every level from kindergarten through college and have also been active in work for handicapped children. This policy emphasizes the importance of the congregation places further and more intensive work for the poor and the underprivileged.

Priest in Moscow
Worcester, Mass.—(RNS)—Father Eugene LaPlante, A.A., a theology instructor at Assumption College in Worcester, was granted a visa by the Soviet Embassy in Washington to serve as chaplain to U.S. Catholics in Moscow and as Apostolic Administrator of the Soviet Union. He succeeds Father Joseph F. Richards, A.A., who has ministered to the American Catholic diplomatic colony in the Russian capital since 1961. Father LaPlante is expected to leave for Moscow around Labor Day. Traditionally held by a member of the Assumptionists, the chaplaincy post is provided for in the 1923 Roosevelt-Litvinoff agreement under which the U.S. recognized Russia.

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
