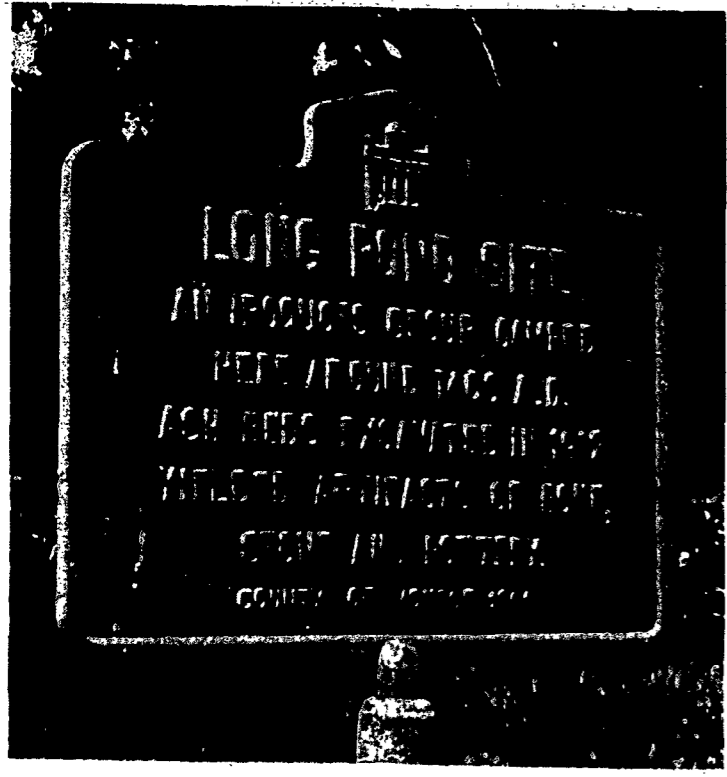


New Parish under Construction

5,320 Enrolled

Summer Schools Of Religion Grow

More than five thousand Catholic youngsters took part in Summer Schools of Religion in the Diocese of Rochester during this past summer. Total enrollment was 5,320 students according to Father Albert H. Schneck, diocesan director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, which includes the summer schools in its overall program.

Largest single enrollment was in Dryden, N.Y., with 220 children from Holy Cross parish and George Junior Republic signed up for the catechetical instruction. Father Thomas A. Cleary is pastor there.

This year's enrollment totaled almost 300 more students than the 1964 registration. 45 of the new enrollees came from Penfield's new Holy Spirit parish, which has just been founded by Father Joseph Lynch.

For 30 years in the Diocese of Rochester, these Summer Schools of Religion have been giving religious instruction to Catholic children who attend Public Schools. This year they were taught by many lay catechists, Sisters of St. Joseph, Sisters of Mercy, Trinitarian Sisters, Sisters of the Divine Child, School of Notre-Dame, and Basilian seminarians.

Lawyers Red Mass 20th Anniversary Set

Twentieth anniversary of the Lawyers' Red Mass will be observed when the Mass to mark the opening of Courts for the fall term is celebrated by Bishop Kearney, Tuesday, Sept. 14 at 9 a.m. in St. Joseph Church, Franklin St.

The colorful ceremony to be attended by judges, lawyers and representatives of civic groups is being directed by Supreme Court Justice Daniel J. O'Mara, general chairman of the Lawyers' Red Mass Committee.

BISHOP KEARNEY will deliver the sermon.

The Bishop celebrated the first Red Mass in St. Joseph's in 1945. At that ceremony, the Bishop said it was an attempt to dedicate their profession, (members of the bench and bar) to the service of God to obtain divine blessings upon their practice and proceedings.

Sisters of Mercy Form Federation

Cincinnati — (RNS) — All United States and Newfoundland congregations of the Sisters of Mercy have formed a federation embracing the generalate, nine provinces, and 18 independent generalates.

The Federation of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas and their Missions will include approximately 15,000 nuns serving in the United States, Canada,

in spirit, habit, and rule of life. Since 1955 the major superiors in the United States and Canada have been meeting regularly for mutual consultation on matters pertaining to their institutes.

At a meeting in Hooksett, N.H. in May, the matter of federation was discussed and accepted in principle. Subsequently approval was received from the Sacred Congregation of Religious in Rome.

Officers of the new Federation are Mother M. Thomas Aquinas Carroll of Pittsburgh, president; Mother M. Teresa Cunningham of Washington, vice-president; Mother M. Bernard Graham of Philadelphia, secretary; Mother M. Patrick McCallion of North Plainfield, N.J., treasurer.

The officers emphasized that the Federation will respect the autonomy of each congregation. It will serve, however, to intensify the unity and mutual helpfulness of the Sisters in the continuous development and improvement of the apostolic works of the Institute and in the spiritual, intellectual, professional, and apostolic growth of the nuns. It will strive to advance the cause of canonization of Mother McAuley and Mother Francis Xavier Ward.

The Federation also looks forward to helping to establish a world federation of the Sisters of Mercy, to involve the approximately 30,000 members in almost every part of the world.
