### New Orthodox Church, Buffalo

Buffalo — (RNS) — Bishop  
Lauriston L. Scaife of Western  
New York, chairman of the  
Episcopal Commission on Rela-  
tions with Eastern Churches,  
said here that "when we merge,  
we submerge" distinctive and  
valuable church beliefs.

"True Christian unity is not  
uniformity," he declared at the  
dedication dinner for the new  
educational building of Saints  
Peter and Paul Russian Ortho-  
dox church. "In true unity each  
has something to bring to the  
whole without losing his own  
Christian identity."

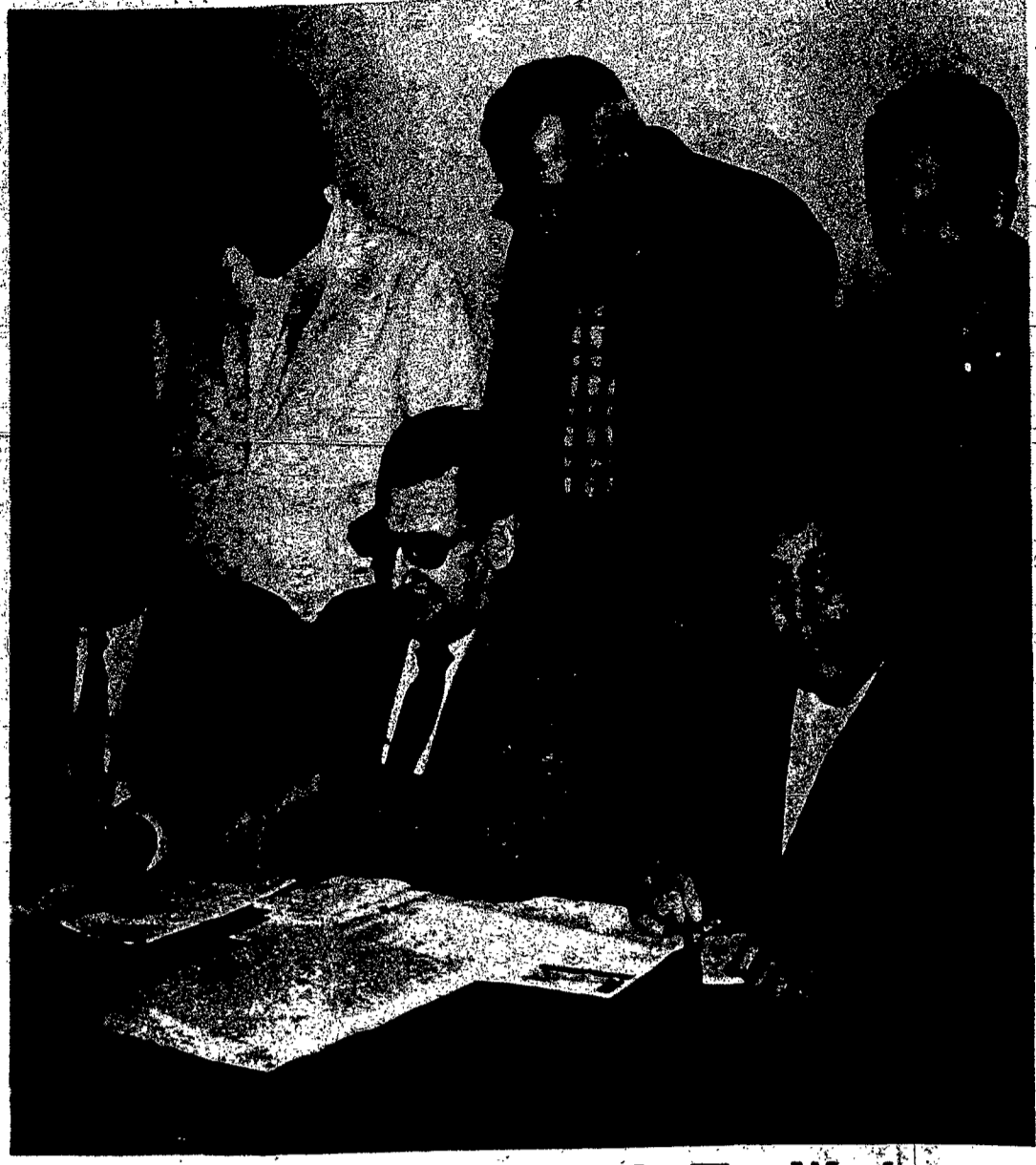
Bishop Scaife said emphati-  
cally, "Unity is not just our  
dream. It is God's will."

Another speaker at the din-  
ner was Msgr. Donato G.  
Valente of Saint Francis of  
Assisi Catholic church, who  
urged his Orthodox neighbors  
to give the best possible instruc-  
tion in their religion and tradi-  
tions. "Children cannot love  
their religion unless they know  
it," he said.

Msgr. Valente said he and  
Father Ernest P. Wolkodoff,  
pastor of Saints Peter and Paul  
church since 1928, are good  
friends, and he reflected, "If  
Pope John had not lived, I  
would not be here speaking to  
you today."

Earlier, the Catholic priest  
had attended a Divine Liturgy  
celebrated by Russian Orthodox  
Archbishop Nikon of Brooklyn.  
"Essentially," Msgr. Valente  
said, "our Masses are the same."

members.

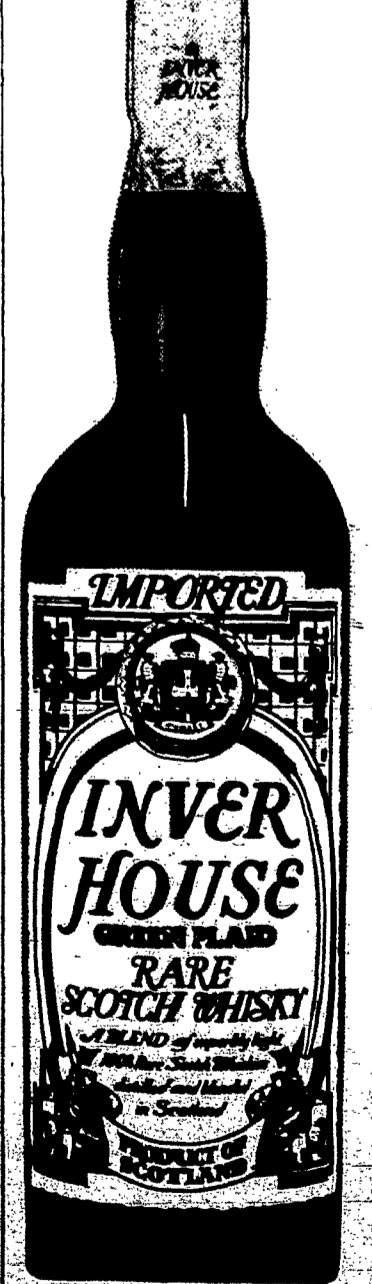
Membership in the Guild

Bishop Kearney gave the Absolution at the Funeral  
Mass for James Edward Hart, Tuesday, Sept. 7 in Holy  
Cross Church. Mr. Hart, 73, of 37 Lowden Road, Greece,  
foreman of Holy Sepulchre  
Cemetery for nearly 30 years,  
died Thursday, Sept. 2, 1965  
at his home.

The Solemn Mass for Requiem  
was celebrated by Rev. Wil-  
liam M. Hart assisted by Rev.  
Richard A. Hart, deacon; (both  
are nephews of Mr. Hart) and  
Rev. Frederick W. Bush, sub-  
deacon.

Mr. Hart who retired from  
his foreman's position last year,  
was said by those who knew  
him to be a genial and com-  
passionate man who knew how  
to uplift the feelings of those who  
visited the cemetery.

One of his brothers was the  
late Monsignor William M.  
Hart, former vicar general of  
the Diocese of Rochester, pastor  
of Corpus Christi Church and  
editor-in-chief of the Catholic  
Courier.

Mr. Hart was born in Roches-  
ter and worked for the Post  
Office before World War I, later  
was a real estate salesman be-  
fore joining the cemetery staff.

His wife, Idabel, died in  
February, 1964 at the age of 70.

Surviving are two daughters,  
Mrs. Walter (Edna) Couch and  
Miss Margaret A. Hart, four  
sons, Bernard W. Robert J.,  
Charles A. Hart of Rochester  
and Lieut. Commander Donald  
F. Hart, U.S.N., of Washington,  
D.C.; one sister, Mrs. Neil (Mar-  
garet) Goodman; one brother,  
Felix F. Hart; also 22 grand-  
children and nine great-grand-  
children.

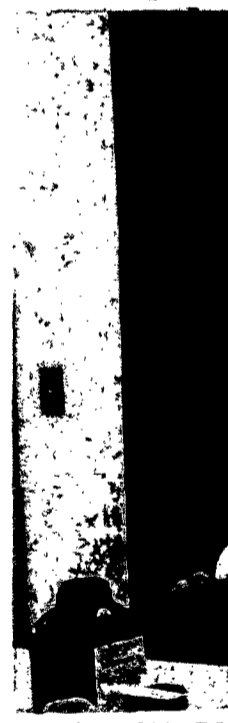
