New Fields Opening To Volunteers

The teen-age "Candy Strippers" (junior volunteers) did such a great job at St. Mary's Hospital this summer that they have created a real problem!

"The problem" is nothing that about 50 new adult Volunteer Aides could not solve however.

"Our 130 Candy Strippers on summer duty worked so well that we were able to open up several new volunteer services."

says Mrs. Emmett (Mary) McCorry, Director of Volunteer Aides. "But with school opening only about 50 of them will be able to stay on, and that in after-school hours, of course."

"We would like to continue these new services, but we'll need quite a few new adult promoters for hospital volunteer volunteers, if we hope to do work."

Mary McCorry, who now works full-time as Director of

St. Mary's volunteer program, is a "graduate" of the program herself. She was a volunteer for seven years, before taking over the Director's job.

Mrs. McCorry, of 153 Rugby Ave., in St. Augustine's parish, is a cheerful and persuasive promoter for hospital volunteer volunteers, if we hope to do work.

"I thoroughly enjoyed my days as a volunteer in the Pediatrics and Admitting sections, she says, "so don't hesitate to recommend it to others."

Even mothers of children at home can profit from some outside interests, Mary McCorry feels.

"Without neglecting your children, you can still give some time to worthwhile projects, which bring new interests into your life," she suggests.

While her own five children were young, Mrs. McCorry lim-

ited herself to parish and school associations. She has served as president of St. Augustine's Mothers' Club, vice-president of Mercy High's Parents Association, and on various committees at Aquinas and McQuaid.

As her brood grew older, she felt she could manage some hospital volunteering, which eventually led her to take the Director's job.

In issuing the call for new volunteers, Mrs. McCorry mentioned that no special educational requirements are needed and that "there is a place for both the leader and the follower."

Women with even a few hours a week (about 3 or so) to spare can fit into the Volunteer Aide program at St. Mary's. Mrs. McCorry can be reached by calling St. Mary's Hospital at FA 8-3300.

Legion Priest Cites Threats On Home Front

Portland — (NC) — The threat of communism in southeast Asia is real enough, but "just as real and threatening is the materialistic, God-getting, self-sufficient, independent rules by which we are living," the national chaplain of the American Legion declared here.

Father Morris N. Dummet, a diocesan priest from New Orleans, called on Legionnaires at their national convention in Portland to use their effective organization in a "continuous crusade against the abuses and offenses and missed opportunities of our nation in this generation."

Speaking at a patriotic and memorial service, he specifically cited the increase in crime and said the "basic causes" must be diminished. He said that a large majority of those in prison in this country come from broken homes, and according to studies, two-thirds of the people in the psychiatrists' offices are from broken families.

Perhaps, said Father Dummet, "we have to revert to those bygone days in which family life was considered the heart of society."

Scholarships For Athletes

New Orleans — (RNS) — Two Negro athletes have been signed to basketball grant-in-aid scholarships to Loyola university here.

They are destined to become the first Negroes to perform for the Jesuit university on the athletic field, though the student body has been integrated for a decade.

Signed by Loyola basketball coach and athletic director Bill Gardner were Leo Frazier and Charles Powell. Frazier, an Orleansian, played his senior year of basketball in high school at Archbishop John Carroll high in Washington, D.C. Powell is a star athlete from Baton Rouge, La.

Lay Editor Denies Charge Of 'Impasse'

Atlanta — (NC) — Freedom is not the real issue in any alleged impasse between bishops and editors of the Catholic press, according to a Catholic lay editor.

This view is expressed by Gerard E. Sherry, managing editor of the Georgia Bulletin newspaper, in his syndicated column "Reapings at Random."

Sherry's comments are in reply to a recent article in America magazine by Msgr. Salvatore Adamo, executive editor of the Catholic Star-Herald of Camden, N.J., complaining of over-control of the diocesan press by the bishops.

Sherry says, however, that "the fault lies mainly in mediocrity and indifference."

Some editors, he says, "don't read enough; they don't study enough; and they are not committed in any sense of the word."

Sherry points to a second problem in "the entrance into Catholic journalism of intellectuals who, wittingly or unwittingly, have assumed the mantle of teaching the teachers."

"They give the impression that no one can teach them a thing; they seem unable to wait for the timeless Church to catch up to them; and yet, with all their knowledge, they lack a sense of history of the perennial youth and aged wisdom of the Church which is Christ," he declares.
