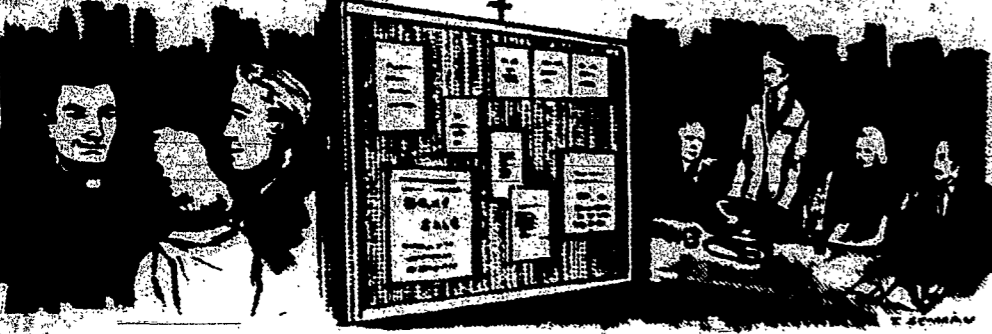


What's New in the Parishes

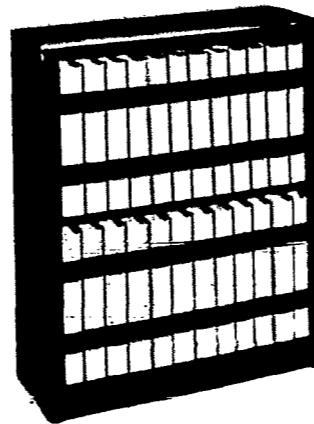
