Father Roberts, 38, is a native of Houston, Tex. He received a bachelor degree in history from Assumption University in 1950 and a bachelor of sacred theology degree from St. Michael's College, Toronto, Ont., in 1955. He also has studied business subjects at the University of Omaha, Omaha, Neb., and the University of Detroit, Detroit, Mich.

Before assuming the treasurer's post at Assumption Father Roberts taught history at Catholic Central High School, Detroit, St. Thomas High School, Houston, and St. Michael's College School, Toronto. During his last two years at Assumption he also served as director of residences.

Sister Angelita Rites Offered at Motherhouse

Funeral Mass for Sister M. Angelita Fitzgerald, a Sister of St. Joseph, was offered Saturday morning, Sept. 11, in the Motherhouse Chapel.

Sister Angelita died Sept. 8, 1965, in St. Joseph Convent Infirmary.

Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by Monsignor Maynard A. Connell, assisted by Father John S. Maloney, deacon, Father William J. Flynn, subdeacon, Father Albert H. Schnacky, master of ceremonies, and Father George M. Kalb, thurifer. Also attending were Father James A. Williams, Father Daniel Brent, and Father Owen Goodwin, SS.CC.

Sister Angelita taught in St. Mary's School, Canandaigua, St. Patrick's, Mount Morris, St. Alphonsus, Auburn, Nativity, Brockport, and for a long period in Immaculate Conception, Ithaca. She was also a teacher in Sacred Heart and Immaculate Conception Schools in Rochester. Her last assignment was in St. Anthony's School, Elmira, from where she retired in 1963. Born in New York City, Sister entered the Sisters from that city in 1910.

Expansion Drive

400 at Kickoff Dinner

Nearly 400 men of three committees held kickoff dinners this week in the \$9 million drive for expansion of facilities at Nazareth and St. John Fisher Colleges.

Solicitation of contributions to the joint college fund is under way by the corporate and major gifts divisions, headed by C. Peter McColough, and by the commerce and industry division under the leadership of Martin F. Birmingham.

Other steps in campaign organization—involving enlistment of 25,000 men for the parish phase of the multi-million dollar drive—are proceeding, meanwhile, under the di-

rection of Paul A. McGuire, chairman of that division.

Formation of a 400-member committee of alumni of the colleges also is under way. Section leaders for Region I will report on worker enlistment at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 22 at Nazareth College.

District special gifts committees in the parish phase will have their kickoff dinners on Sept. 27, 28 and 29. Solicitation of their prospects will begin immediately thereafter.

Chairmen for the general solicitation in the parishes slated Oct. 31 and Nov. 14, already have been selected, as have

vice-chairmen and division leaders.
