

Women Urged to Shape A World in Transition

"You're living in a revolution—and if you don't realize it, you're not with it," Father John Coonan told his hearers at a leadership workshop of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women (D.C.C.W.) at St. Cecilia's Church, Elmira, last Saturday.

The world is going through a transition period, socially, technologically and politically, the moderator of the St. Cecilia's workshop said in his address. "The Church too is having its own revolution—a peaceful one—in the adjustments being shaped by Vatican Council II," he stressed.

Catholic women can be a powerful force in the updating of the Church, he said—responsibility and organization.

Responsible women not only grasp what the challenge is, but offer themselves generously and stick with it until it is finished," he went on.

Organization is the second essential, he felt, and used the occasion to point out the many helps given a group affiliated with the Council of Catholic Women, and utilizing its program.

This morning session was devoted to a model meeting of a mythical parish society, while the afternoon saw workshops covering the 5-committee system of the D.C.C.W. and a president-moderators meeting led by Mrs. Ronald Gledhill, new president of the Diocesan Council, conducting her first meeting.

Prelate Directs Formation Of Parish Study Groups

St. Louis — (RNS) — Joseph Cardinal Ritter, Archbishop of St. Louis, called on all priests in his diocese to work with "enthusiasm and zeal" in forming small discussion groups in each parish to study the decrees of the Second Vatican Council.

The move came only two weeks after the cardinal has announced a postponement of plans for an Archdiocesan Assembly, or "Little Council," as it is called, until parishes had progressed in a study of conciliar decrees. He said then that he would present directives on the formation of study groups.

CARDINAL RITTER also announced he was extending the length of the Fall and Spring clergy conferences because "the Council has already shown that formalized continuing education is necessary for diocesan priests."

He said he would issue directives for parish level participation study groups in a pastoral letter shortly. His letter to priests was to "invite your fullest cooperation in carrying out the directives presented."

Parish discussion groups and clergy programs will be in preparation for the Archdiocesan Assembly which will be scheduled later, the cardinal said. "The success of the Assembly will depend on how well our people are informed on the matters discussed at the Second Vatican Council."

Clergy conferences will be extended to a full day "to keep the clergy abreast with what is happening and what has already happened in theology, liturgy, Scripture and catechetics."

He noted that developments "have been rapid and quick and will come at an ever-quickening pace."

Bath School Adds Grade

Bath—Addition of the eighth grade at St. Mary's School here this fall, raises the anticipated enrollment by 100 pupils, and fills all classrooms in the five-year-old Catholic school.

The first graduation exercises will be held in June, 1966.
