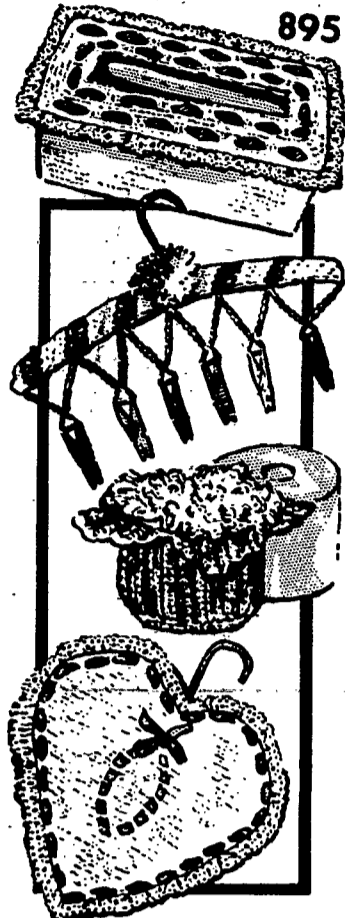


New Dorm

'Sky Pilot' Grounds Self

Cincinnati — (NC) — Father Albert DeFrancesco, pastor of Our Lady of the Presentation Church here, quit flying as of Sept. 14.

He made the decision after making two emergency landings in the single-engine Cessna plane he had attempted to pilot from nearby Hamilton, Ohio, to a town in Indiana. Wind, fog, and darkness caused him to land first at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, near Dayton, where he received directions for returning to Hamilton.

The elements kept him off course again, so he landed the plane soon after on Interstate 71, a new expressway, near Wilmington, Ohio. A flying instructor from Hamilton flew the plane back to the airport while Father DeFrancesco drove the instructor's car home.
