Religious Law Topic Of Two Day Workshop

A two-day workshop for Sisters of Saint Joseph of Rochester was conducted on September 18-19 at Nazareth Academy by a panel of speakers from the Institute of Man of Duquesne University.

Heading this panel was the Rev. Adrian van Kaam, C.S. Sp., Professor of Psychology at Duquesne, founder and director of the Institute of Man, and author of the current religious best-seller *Personality and Religion*. Father van Kaam's talks were on the meaning of the three religious vows—obedience, chastity, and poverty—in this transitional period in the Church and in the world—one marked by change, questioning, and crisis. Noting that the evolution of animals pre-shadows in many ways the development of humans into fulfilled persons, he pointed out that men, too, must "listen to reality" and adapt themselves to their surroundings; that they must contribute to the survival of the group through a non-violating "togetherness" which includes not only the reproduction of the species, but also an availability for the whole given; even to the point of self-sacrifice; and, finally, that they must practice the wise use of material things.

For all men, Father van Kaam stated, these areas are inextricably bound to the very structure of their human development. Those who make the vows of religion are called to be at the center of human evolution, and to witness to the transcendence of these human goods, to their ultimate source and goal in the loving God.

SISTER MARY AQUINAS, R.S.M., the second panelist, is a Professor of Literature at Mt. Mercy College and lecturer at the Institute of Man. She and Father van Kaam have recently collaborated on a book to be published this winter, *The Demon and the Dove*. Sister's talk on "Literature and Personality in the Religious Life" was largely an analysis of Tolstoy's character, Anna Karenina, in his novel of the same name.

To demonstrate that an increased understanding of human nature can be a profitable by-product of the reading of great literature, Sister outlined the five crises in Anna's life leading up to and following from her making a wrong decision. At the same time, Sister showed how these crises and the psychological aspects surrounding them may have basic parallels in any person's life.

The third panelist, Rev. J. L. F. Dankelman, C.S.S.R., Dutch-born as is Father van Kaam, is this year's visiting professor at Duquesne University, a theologian whose most recent book, *Christ Now*, is presently being translated into English.

FATHER DANKELMAN'S talks were on "Religion and the Person." He stressed the fact that Christianity is infinitely more than a morally correct life or a system of dogmas. It is primarily a conversion from sin and a personal encounter in faith and love with the living God.

From this relationship in love, a code of activity will develop, but permeating this development must be the experience through which lovers' knowledge and affection grow; in this man-God relationship, these experiences are primarily the Sacraments.

Furthermore, the growth of a person's relationship with God, as with his fellow man, is not the "straight-line" of a mechanical process, but a rhythmic one—an advance, a withdrawal, and a further advance. Man must recognize this, and await it peacefully—not with

Styled-to-Style Printed Pattern

We have been asked by CBS television network to be briefly absent from the Council this week in order to come to New York to serve as special narrators of Pope Paul VI's visit to the United States. Their extensive coverage will begin at 9:30 a.m. (EDST) on October 4th and we will follow the Holy Father through his entire visit. What an honor this is. But what an unsurpassed historical event is the Holy Father's peace plea to the people of the entire world at the United Nations!

One has seen the desire of the Church to be more closely united with all who believe in God in the great ecumenical movement of recent years. But the gradual moving of the Church into the world is an even more significant movement. Benedict XV was crowned Pontiff in the rear of St. Peter's at the altar of the Blessed Mother, about as far from the front door as one could possibly be in the Basilica. Pius XI moved forward from the altar in the rear to the walls and stepped onto a balcony. This was the first time since 1870 that a Pontiff was crowned outside of the Basilica of St. Peter's. John XXIII walked on those stairs, was crowned outside on the balcony and bade the world come to himself, stretching out his arms like the arms of columns of Bernini welcoming all men to himself. But Paul VI was crowned, not on the balcony, but out in the square of St. Peter's in the presence of all men.

The pilgrimage of Paul VI to the Holy Land was a return again to origins, but also a movement to a civilization that is not Christian but Jewish and Moslem. His visit to India brought the Church closer to Buddhists and Hindus. But the present visit shows to the world in a most dramatic way the Church's involvement with all men of all religions and all races in their common striving for unity and peace.

How can each of us participate in this "moving out" of the Church? By being away each day that each of us is a brother to all men, by recognizing that the Mystical Body of Christ, of which we are all members, includes the starving farmer in Latin America, the rejected leper in Africa, the sick child in India who may never reach his teens. The Society for the Propagation of the Faith is the Holy Father's own society to help the poor of the world.
