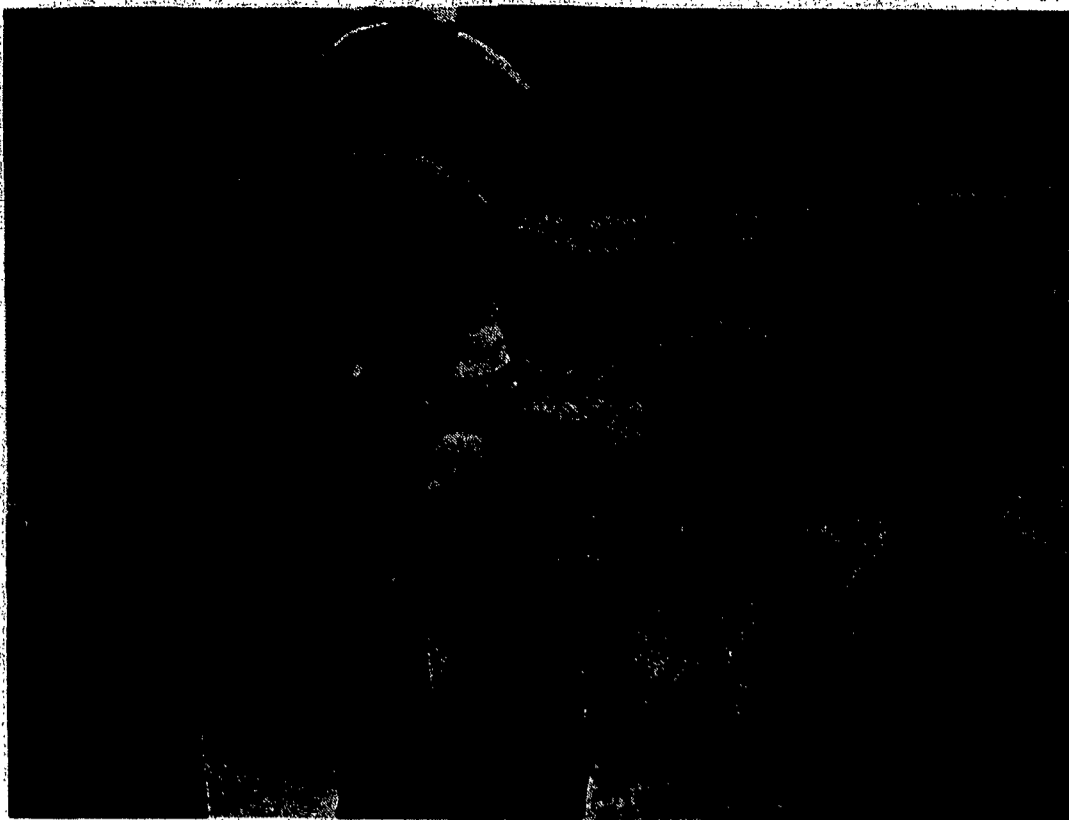

'Old Fogies and Beatniks'

Dissent Deplored

New York—(RNS)—Catholic students here heard a famed Jesuit priest and educator deplore "widening dissent" among Catholics on issues confronting the Second Vatican Council.

Father Robert I. Gannon, S.J., a former president of Fordham University, also warned that the growing role of government in the U.S. could bring about a "pre-planned existence" for Americans.

He cautioned Catholic college and university students to become "neither old fogies blocking the path of progress nor beatniks without respect for the values of the past."

More than a thousand members of Newman clubs and their chaplains heard Father Gannon speak at the Golden Jubilee banquet of the National Newman Congress. During their week-long convention the delegates of Newman Clubs around the country had studied the spirit of ecumenism and the effect of Vatican II.

FATHER GANNON, now assistant to the resident of Fordham, examined current efforts to arrive at Christian unity: "We cannot expect uniformity of opinion among the world's peoples," he said, "but only unity of the heart. Our concern should not only be for the brethren separated from the Church, but for those within our own family who are currently engaged in sharp controversy."

He deplored "the widening dissensions among Catholics both lay and cleric which tend to divide us on issues before the Vatican Council."

"Everyone is trying to get his point of view across. We find extremists on both sides of every question — those who think all new ideas are dangerous, and those who label every attempt to cling to tradition as reactionary."

A happy blending of the new and old would, in his opinion, prove the best solution. "The Church has always been a living, growing organism, adapting to the spirit of the changing centuries, but built on the bedrock of unchanging principles," he commented.

He decried a trend in government to absorb every phase of the individual's existence. Large-scale planning tends to regard man in the mass, and hence, to dehumanize, he charged.

"If we don't look out," he said, "we shall find every aspect of our existence pre-planned. In addition to the chicken in the pot, we are now being assured of painless and effortless entrance and exit from schools at all levels, a guaranteed income, the disappearance of failure, a Ph.D. driving every taxi. The ultimate was reached recently when our government promised us happiness. Does this mean the disappearance of the unhappy marriage?"

"It sounds good," he added, "but such a policy can have little in common with the true nature of man. It has led us down the road during the past decades to strife at home and abroad: American society today is marked by conflict on every level. Abroad, American policy aims at straightening out the world morally and financially. We know how disastrous this has proved to be. Our blundering billions have purchased more hate for us all over the world than anything our enemies could do."

Don't Scrimp On Paper, Bishops Told

Vatican City — (RNS) — Thrift is the message to bishops — and certainly not when it comes to economizing on paper — the more than 2,200 bishops attending a Vatican II congregation were admonished.

The verbal slap on the wrist came from Archbishop Ferlic Felici, the Council's general secretary, who complained that "various amendments to Council drafts submitted by the Fathers have not always been of good quality paper."

"This," he said, "might cause trouble and disaffection for future generations and historians undertaking a study of Council documents."

He announced that, beginning the next day, the Fathers would receive specially prepared forms which would insure neatness and uniformity in presenting amendments, and also speed up the proceedings.

Presumably acting in response to Pope Paul VI's motto proprio creating the synod of bishops that will serve the pontiff as an advisory body, Archbishop Felici asked that the presidents of national episcopal conferences present in Rome notify him immediately of their Rome addresses and telephone numbers.

Most of the bishops who will serve on the episcopal synod will be named by the national conferences.

Archbishop Felici added that in cases where the president of the national conference was not in Rome, the senior bishop in each country should provide the same data.

5,000 Gypsies Visit Lourdes

Lourdes, France — (RNS) — Five thousand gypsies from many European areas brought unusual color and animation to the famed Marian shrine here when they arrived for the ninth international Gypsy pilgrimage.

The occasion saw the French government grant a dispensation from the law which forbids gypsies to camp for more than 24 hours in any one place.

The only other time that gypsies may remain over the legal time limit is on May 24, when they gather at Saintes Maries de la Mer, a tiny fishing village on the French Mediterranean coast.
