McAuley Adult Lectures Begin

Three sessions on Friday, Oct. 15 and one on Sunday, Oct. 17 will inaugurate the 1966-67 McAuley Lectures, sponsored by Catherine McAuley College and extending from October 15 to December 19. All lectures begin at 8 p.m.

The three Friday evening lectures include literary reviews and music appreciation. Sister Mary Petrus, R.S.M., will begin

discussions of the modern American novel with Ernest Hemingway's "The Sun Also Rises." A review of James Michener's "The Source" will be made by Sister Mary Beatrice, R.S.M. Sister Mary Majella, R.S.M. will discuss "Color, Texture and Design in the Art of Music."

ON SUNDAY, Father Joseph P. Brennan will present the

first lecture in theology and scripture, "The Church and the Synagogue in the New Testament."

Reviews include presentations by priest guests, religious and lay women. Sister Mary Beatrice and Father James L. Callan contributed to last year's McAuley Lectures. Father Richard Torrey, Mrs. James Wright and Mrs. Daniel G. Kennedy are guests new to the series. In succeeding lectures Sister Mary Petrus will discuss novels of Faulkner, Fitzgerald, Warren and J. D. Salinger.

HIGHLIGHTING the theology and scripture series will be the eminent theologian and author, Father Daniel Berrigan, S.J., who will speak in the Mercy High Auditorium on Sunday evening, October 31. Other priests contributing to this series include Father Albert J. Shamon, Father James Lawlor and Father William Shannon.

In planning the McAuley Lectures, it was the expressed purpose of college administrators to provide "interested adults in the Rochester area with the opportunity to engage in intellectual stimulation" through participation in a program that would up-date their formal education. With the exception of Father Brennan's talk, all lectures will be held in Catherine McAuley College, 1437 Blossom Road.

"I want to enter a convent, become a nun."

It was as simple as this when our Ginny announced to us, many months ago, what had no doubt been in her heart and mind for a long time. Every Catholic parent whose child has felt this calling has had the same reaction as we—emotions too deep for words.

Coincidentally, Ginny's sister also announced to us on that very same evening that she wanted to be married.

That was a relief, with before many times, and it was a little easier to get down to cases.

Ginny's Choice Back to Ginny. "What order?" we asked.

"Two I'm thinking about, haven't quite decided, and maybe neither of them will have me."

"Not have you?" Ire of the Head of the House was aroused. "They'd be lucky to have you!"

Ginny wasn't so sure. "Maybe I'm no prize for anybody outside of this family; you're prejudiced, but this is what I really feel I ought to do."

Usually, our house is kind of tranquil, but that night the two of us were like a pair of punch-drunk prize-fighters, groggy from the double news.

Wedding went through on schedule, with Ginny as maid of honor. Still preparations for her vocation, with the Order decided upon, "supplication" accepted and Ginny was on her long and intricate way toward "entering."

No pressure was brought to bear—quite the opposite. It was a voluntary offering of herself as a potential candidate.

Parents Reassured Whether this is routine in religious orders, we wouldn't know. But one of the most reassuring, refreshing experiences came about as result of a letter:

"Dear Mr. and Mrs. Daly: Within a few months, your daughter will take initial steps to become a member of our religious family. We recognize that for many reasons, you anticipate the day with mixed feelings. Perhaps you dread the separation; or you think her reasons for wanting this way of life are nebulous; or you see the life itself as lost in a veil of mystery. All this may lead to a growing uneasiness.

"On your daughter's part, she will not find it easy to enter into a new way of life. To do so with the support of those who love her is hard enough. To do so without such support is almost impossible.

"In all probability, nothing will make the eventual separation easy.

"Nevertheless, the life your daughter has shown an interest in by becoming a candidate for entrance should not be shrouded in mystery for you, her parents, or anyone else for that matter. In reality, the formation program of which she will become a part is one to rejoice in because of the personnel involved, the opportunities for development afforded each individual, and the surroundings of the whole process."

"Come See for Yourself..." Then followed an invitation to participate in an entire afternoon of "dialogue"; on one side, parents and girls about to enter; on the other directors of vocations, mistress of postulants, mistress of novices, mistress of Juniors and directress of studies. Each gave a short talk, then the question period.

Mothers' questions were chiefly concerned as to rules and restrictions; emphatically not a "filles of the field" attitude. Fathers' questions had to do with their daughters' education: would it stop abruptly upon entrance into the postulancy? No, we were told, the girls would go on with their education, would be offered intellectual fare in keeping with their ability. Financial questions also were raised; yes, continue your daughter's hospitalization insurance; these would be the required articles. Yes, you may come to see her once a month, etc., etc.

Then, refreshments and mingling with other parents and the Sisters, a tour of the house where the postulants—all 76—would live, followed by Benediction in the chapel.

An afternoon none of us will forget, eye opening in every way.

During following days, we were reminded of a saying of Thomas Merton:

"Anxiety is inevitable in an age of crisis like ours. Don't make it worse by deceiving yourself and acting as if you were immune to all inner trepidation. God does not ask you not to feel anxious, but to trust in Him no matter how you feel."
