At Our House Ginny's 'T-Day'

By MARY TINLEY DALY "Get thee to a nunnery, go, farewell! This admonition in Hamlet (Act 3, scene 1), is not exactly the way it's done 1085-wise as our Ginny learned.

Gone are the days, if they ever existed, when a girl with the slightest leaning toward the religious life was rushed behind "the wall," imprisoned, as it were, for life.

Among Catholics, parsons, priests, nuns, and laymen, when Ginny let it be known a few months ago that she wanted to enter a convent.

"Oh, no!" was the horrified reaction on the part of some adult friends. "Not Ginny! Why she's so gay, so pretty—well, so normal!"

From others came the frantic, "But you're not going to permit it, are you?" Then, with a comforting pat on the shoulder, followed advice: "She's still in your custody, you know. You can't let them take her. I know girls get foolish ideas, sometimes, but if you invite young people in, give parties, she'll get this nonsense out of her head."

There is really no comprehensible response, except disappointment and a certain irritation, to such an attitude. Of course Ginny is gay, perfectly "normal," else "they" would not permit her to enter. But to explain that this is the very kind of person who should be allowed to follow her own conscience would be defensive and, frankly, a waste of breath.

Still other people, thinking this decision an impulse of the moment, tried to laugh Ginny out of the idea: "You've just gone to Catholic schools too long, Ginny. This summer, with a trip to Europe, then a job, parties and all the fun—you'll forget all about this nun business!"

Such pressures, well-meant but irresponsible, did nothing to sway Ginny from her resolve, but by the same token, added nothing to her peace of mind. She knew exactly what she was giving up: family, home, friends, pretty clothes, social life.

"I'd thought about all this before I made petition to enter," she said, "and if I hadn't, it was all brought out again during the series of interrogations and examinations."

Fortunately, reactions were heartening from other, more understanding relatives and friends:

"Good for you, Ginny! Wish I had the nerve. I'll pray for you."

"Ginny, I think it's wonderful and I hope you'll be very, very happy."

And thoughtful letters from a priest and a nun helped, too, commending her for the generous response to God's first call, encouraging her to give her whole heart to the effort, to persist through the thick-and-thin (about 50 per cent of each) during the trial period.

"And God will make dear to you later on whether or not this is to be your lifetime calling."

So, during late summer, preparations went on. After quitting her summer job, Ginny's days were spent in social activities and the more somber preparations: unpacking a wardrobe of black and white clothing and supplies; packing

African Layman Speaks in Council

Vatican City (AP) — Dressed in the colorful robes of an African tribesman, a lay auditor from Togo stood before the world's bishops at the Vatican Council and pleaded for recognition of the layman's role as a witness to the Gospel in mission lands.

Speaking in French, Eusebe Adjakpley thanked Council Fathers on behalf of his fellow auditors for the document on the Church's missionary activity. He said it would add an "indispensable teaching and a new call" to the layman's role in the Church.

His words, he continued, were spoken "in the name of a great number of lay people—men and women, youth and adults, married couples also—who desire, in the diversity of their vocations, to place their witness and their skills at the service of the Church's mission of evangelization."

To youth especially, "born into a world which was already on the way to unification, already conscious of new destinies, full of enthusiasm for tasks of development, for building up civil society," he addressed through the council a call to be "at least equally committed to the essential task of the Christian: bringing Christ to the world and the world to Christ."

Although the Council agenda called for the beginning of discussion on the last Council document still to be debated—the one on priestly life and ministry—only the report on that document was read before closing time since 10 Fathers invoked "the 70 signature rule" to continue debate on the schema on the Church's missionary activity. Closure on this discussion had been voted the previous day, but according to Council rules a speaker may continue debate after closure if his request to speak is backed by the signatures of 70 other Council Fathers.

THE HOLY FATHER'S MISSION AID TO THE ORIENTAL CHURCH
