LBJ Asks Churches Help In Vietnam War Relief

Washington—(RNS)—A team of representatives of American voluntary agencies is traveling to Vietnam at the request of President Johnson to survey the relief and drainage problems there and to make recommendations for both governmental and voluntary agency handling of the problems.

The seven-member team, accompanied by the State Department's Vietnam relief coordinator, was scheduled to leave from Dulles International Airport Saturday, Oct. 16, following conferences with Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and State Department officials. They will spend a week to ten days in Vietnam, surveying refugee conditions, meeting with consulting agencies already at work there, and consulting with U.S. and South Vietnam government officials.

The government-sponsored mission is coordinated and was proposed by the American Council on Voluntary Agencies (ACVA), which includes nearly all church-related services and relief units as well as secular agencies. The ACVA proposed the mission in August of this year. On October 9, after considerable negotiation and discussion, Vice President Humphrey, acting on behalf of President Johnson, wired a formal request asking Council representatives "to make an on-the-scene appraisal of the refugee situation and initiate immediately expanded programs in cooperation with the United States and Vietnamese government agencies concerned with meeting the problem."

Hugh D. Farley, associate secretary of the Division of Overseas Ministries of the National

Council of Churches, will head the team in his capacity as chairman of the ACVA.

Other ACVA members are: Msgr. John F. McCarthy, assistant executive director, Catholic Relief Services; Bernard A. Confer, executive secretary of Lutheran World Relief; Judge Robert W. Hanson, of CARE, Inc.; Willard Krabill, M.D., former director in Vietnam of the Mennonite Central Committee; and John C. Whitehead, International Rescue Committee.

'Impeded' Prelate Dies

Vatican City—(RNS)—Vatican Radio reported that Bishop Bertalan Badalik of Veszprem, Hungary, died on Oct. 11 at the age of 74.

The bishop has been listed in the *Annuario Pontificio*, the Vatican yearbook, as "impeded," or unable to administer his office because of Communist oppression.

In May, Bishop Badalik was reported as living in Hejce, northeast Hungary, still not permitted to enter his diocese or to exercise his episcopal functions. The report said, however, that he could travel in Hungary, except in his own diocese.

Bishop Badalik was a nationally-known Dominican preacher, and a superior when he was named Bishop of Veszprem by Pope Pius XII in 1949. The diocese was once occupied by Josef Cardinal Mindszenty, Primate of Hungary, who has been in asylum at the American legation in Budapest since 1956.

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Dignity, Not Riches To Decorate Churches

Verona—(NC)—The Lord's house must be adorned with "dignity rather than riches," a cardinal who is an expert on liturgical matters said here.

Deploping the tendency to classify any church decoration which is expensive as "beautiful," Giacomo Cardinal Lercaro of Bologna said one must make a distinction between beauty and those things that are rich, abundant or overloaded. Cardinal Lercaro is head of the ecumenical council's postconciliar commission on the liturgy.

"Let images and statues, utensils and ornaments be limited," he said. "Let not even the most humble, vulgar things that are mass produced be introduced into the churches. Let very picture, every statue bear a signature."

"The objects of the Lord's house be genuine. All fakery—fake gold, fake marble, artificial flowers and artificial wax—is abominable and always incompatible with the needs of the house of the true God, who wants worshippers venerating Him in spirit and truth."

In his address opening the Italian National Liturgical Week, Cardinal Lercaro said the "heavy heritage of the past" must be overcome.

"That heritage," he continued, "transformed liturgical vestments into breastplates burdened with gold, and more recently into insipid, imitation silk rags which could be anything but vestments. It introduced an ostentatiously feminine abundance of lace—once perhaps beautiful, but later cheap and vulgar to albs and surplices."

Priest Teaches Journalism

Iowa City—(NC)—Father John B. Bremner, a priest of the archdiocese of Brisbane, Australia, has been appointed head of the news-editorial journalism sequence in the school of Journalism at the University of Iowa.

A member of the journalism faculty at the state university since the 1964 summer session, Father Bremner received his Ph.D. in mass communications in January of this year. He is in residence at St. Joseph's parish, Hills, Iowa.

Father Bremner was national secretary of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith in Australia from 1946 to 1948 and editor of the society's three magazines.
