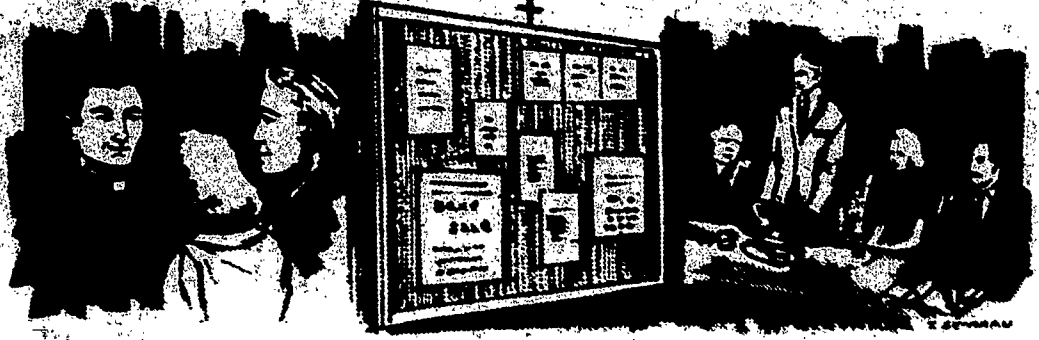

Pope Tells Carmelites

Stress Spiritual Life

Confirmation of the historic role of the Discalced Carmelites — as teachers and guides in the spiritual life — has been expressed in two documents issued from Rome this year.

(Discalced Carmelite nuns in the Diocese of Rochester are the Carmelite Nuns monastery in Pittsford and The Carmelite Friars Novitiate in Waverly.)

Earlier this year, Pope Paul VI, in a letter to the Provincials of the Order meeting at Mt. Carmel in the Holy Land, encouraged the Carmelites to a "desired renewal," in accord with the spirit of Vatican II. He urged them to observe the norms "regulating contemplation and the apostolate" as given to them by St. Teresa of Avila and St. John of the Cross.

THE HOLY FATHER noted that the religious life designed by these twin beacons of the Carmelite Order, "is in most exact accordance" with what the Second Vatican Council prescribes for religious.

Pope Paul went on to challenge the present day Carmelites to concentrate to expounding "the fundamental norms of the spiritual life," and the principles which govern ascetic and mystical theology, especially "the proper directing of a life of prayer and contemplation."

The Holy Father expressed his wish that the Friars offer spiritual guidance first of all to their co-religious, the nuns of the Carmelite Order, "that they may attain the summit of their vocation."

RESPONDING to the Pope's directive, the Carmelite General, Very Rev. Father Anastasius of the Holy Rosary, wrote recently to the members of the Order. Urging them to appreciate the special mission of the Carmelites, he said that the Pope's challenge was "well suited to the nature of our vocation and the rich spiritual inheritance" left by the saintly masters of the Order.

Some specific ways to implement the Papal recommendations were listed by the Carmelite General:

- Through instruction of the Order's members in the whole extent of spiritual doctrine and the interior life.
- Attendance of some fathers from each province at the Carmelite Institute of Spirituality in Rome.
- Writing articles, books on the spiritual life.
- Conducting retreats and days of recollection.
- Establishing retreat houses and schools of prayer.

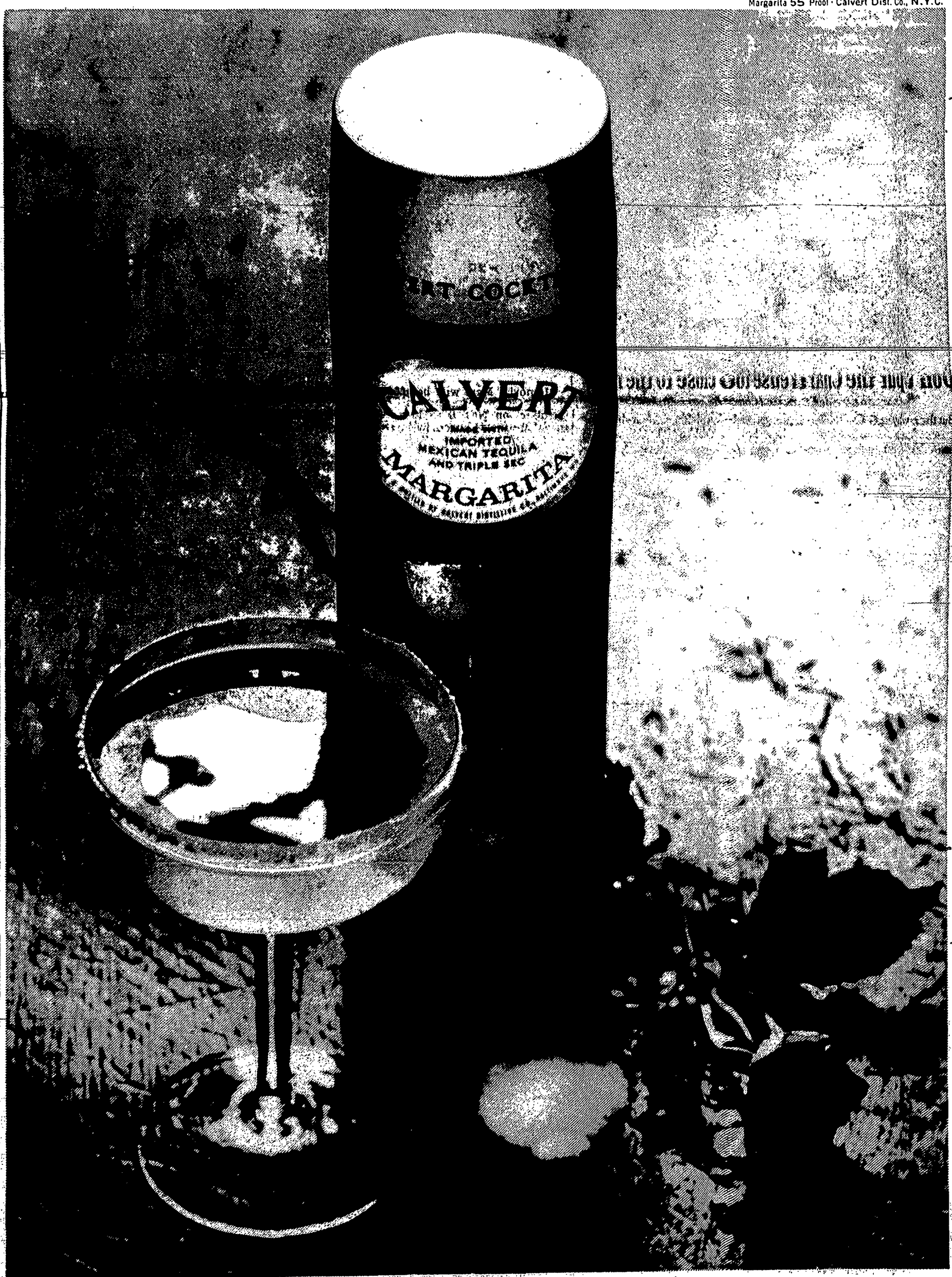
