**Great Sport, Little Glory
For Cross Country Runner**

When you think of it, it is surprising that the sport of cross country is among the least known of high school sports. The sport is easy to follow, requires no elaborate facilities and almost no equipment. It is a sport for nearly everybody; size and strength are not crucial. It provides good exercise among lovely autumn surroundings, and is one of the world's oldest sports.

Yet, long-distance running, a popular sport among the early Greeks and the American Indians, receives little attention from the American public.

In the sport of cross country, seven men from one school race against seven men from another school (or group of schools) over a two-mile, rock-

strewn, up-and-down woodland trail. Points are awarded according to each man's place of finish—the winner gets one point, the tenth-place man gets 10 points. The team with the **LOWEST** score wins the meet.

The cross country team at Aquinas Institute is currently enjoying its best season. Coached by Mr. Thomas Bales, C.S.B., a Basilian Scholastic, the Irish harriers have made outstanding showings in several statewide meets.

Many of the Little Irish runners will argue that cross country is one of the most grueling sports in high school athletics, including football. Said one harrier, "the football team practices for less than three months, but to be good in cross country

you need year-round workouts. Also, there's lots of glory from the spectators and newspapers in football, but none in cross country."

Coach Bales believes that no sport requires such self-punishment as cross country. He says that the young man who wins is the one who can push himself the hardest, the fellow who has the sternest self-discipline and the most unrelenting will.

This year Aquinas unveiled a spanking new cross country course, beautifully laid out and relatively free of holes and stones. Situated in the wooded area behind the Aquinas faculty building, it is complete with a rustic bridge named in honor of Rev. John Ware, former track coach at Aquinas.

Irish Runners Score Again

Balance proved the difference last week as Aquinas Institute won the eighth annual Alred-Almond Invitational Cross-Country meet. The Irish captured the tournament trophy despite a first place finish by McQuaid's Eric Kendrick.

Aquinas placed its five runners in the first 16 to edge McQuaid Jesuit High School for team honors with 51 points. McQuaid was second with 84. Watertown, with 86 points, was third. Bishop Kearney, with 101 points, was fourth.

Walsh, 19-0**

Bishop Kearney High's up and coming griders proved good "mudders" last week, to conquer Bishop Walsh of Olean, 19-0, in a rain-soaked game played at Aquinas Stadium.

Kearney's third counter came in the same period. Taking over on down on the Walsh 45, it took just two plays for the final T.D. It was a 38-yard dash by Rip Coleman which made it 18-0, and Laverne Dickinson's kick ended the scoring at 19-0.

As usual, Coach Dan Coughlin's club was rugged on defense. Bishop Walsh managed only 46 yards all day, and failed to get a single first down.

Nips McQuaid**

Watertown built a fence that McQuaid couldn't knock down, and it cost the Knights an upset victory over the unbeaten Cyclones last Saturday. The fence was a muddy one, made up of Watertown blockers who kept McQuaid tacklers away from Johnny Rivers as he churned 77 yards up the sideline for the decisive score in Watertown's 20-12 win.

Having missed out in their bid for a 3-3 record, the Knights will head Buffalo way this Friday night for a meeting with winless St. Francis of Athol Springs.

The Knights were leading by a 12-7 count when Steve Hromjak dropped back to punt from his own 40. The boot came down to Watertown's Rivers on his own 23, and he evaded the first McQuaid men downfield and picked up steam as he reached drier ground near the sideline. Watertown's fence cut off any further McQuaid shots at the Cyclone halfback, and he went all the way to make the score 13-12.

McQuaid, which had answered Watertown's first-period TD with Hromjak's 73-yard kickoff return right up the middle, tried to come back again with its passing attack. But a promising drive was cut short by an interception, and the Knights were unable to get possession again, a long Watertown drive eating up the remaining time and posting a final 6 points on the board.

The last period reversal saw McQuaid regain the hometown club but fail to cash in its chances after the first quarter. Hromjak's touchdown bolt put them back in the game at 7-6 midway through that period, and Jim Robinson's pass interception a few plays later set them up again at the Watertown 30. After Mark Schiller and Mike Miller had picked up a first down on the 18, Tom Miller caught the Cyclone secondary off-guard with a pass that found his favorite target, Steve Rooney, all alone in the end zone.

McQuaid's JV's lost to Mooney, 26-0, while the Frosh scored their second win of the week with a 19-0 second-half victory over Mooney's Frosh. Earlier the McQuaid first-year griders had taken the measure of Edison Tech, 26-6.

Still Unbeaten

Elmira — The Notre Dame Crusaders won their fifth straight game last week, running over Oxford High by a 32-14 count.

The key figure was Joel Ramlich, junior halfback, who scored two first period touchdowns. The first TD climaxed a 55-yard drive and Ramlich went over on a five-yard scamper. Moments later, his six-yard TD run highlighted a 40-yard ND march. With Jack Leonard kicking both extra points, ND led at the end of the first period 14-0.

In the second quarter, senior end Don Carmody hauled down a pass from quarterback Mike Amisano and turned it into a 30-yard scoring play. At halftime, ND held a 20-0 edge. The Crusaders started where they left off at the half break in the third quarter. Joe Cascio came through the Oxford line and outran the secondary to add six points with a 40-yard jaunt. In the same period, lineman Bernie Minch broke through 5.

The Oxford defensive line to block the punt attempt and quickly picked up the loose ball to race 30 yards for ND's last touchdown of the game.

In the last few minutes of the game, Oxford scored two quick touchdowns. Both times the conversion attempt was good.

Ramlich led the ND rushers picking up 120 yards in 14 carries. Cascio, on ten attempts, picked up 110 yards.

The ND defense was very effective, allowing Oxford only 188 total offensive yards. The defense intercepted two passes also.

The Crusaders are bidding for their first undefeated season. Their record to date is five wins, no losses and one tie. Tomorrow ND faces a strong Elmira Free Academy team which beat Southside High October 23 by a score of 28-0. Notre Dame tied Southside 13-13 in its first game of the season. Next week the Crusaders travel to Hornell for their final game November 5.

**Aquinas Over
Linton by 27-18**

Aquinas Institute bounced back into the victory column last Friday night as a determined Little Irish team took advantage of some early breaks to upset Linton High School's Blue Devils, 27-18 before a rain-soaked crowd at Aquinas Stadium.

The Irish, anxious to return to the win column after having their win streak snapped by Kearney last week, completely outplayed Linton to run their record to 4 wins and one loss.

Aquinas jumped off to a 7-0 lead early in the game when Greg Manly pounced on a fumble. Pat DiNicola swept left end for the score. John Basile booted the extra point. Linton stayed close when halfback Bob Grant broke loose for an 80-yard run less than a minute later.

Early in the second quarter Aquinas made it 14-6 when halfback Don Hall scooted five yards to climax a 58-yard scoring drive. Again Basile's kick was good. Linton narrowed it

to 14-12 at halftime when George Gottwald plunged a yard after the Blue Devils recovered an Aquinas fumble on the Irish 20-yard line.

The winners scored back-to-back touchdowns in the third and fourth periods and boosted their margin to 27-12. Halfback Pat DiNicola scored the third period TD from three yards out and Hall the fourth period tally on a 15-yard run.

Linton got its last touchdown in the final period when Quarterback Pete Zeppetelli connected on a seven-yard scoring pass to End Hay Gray.

Pat DiNicola was the workhorse for the Irish, carrying the ball 21 times for 185 yards while scoring two touchdowns. Fred Recchio also made fine gains, carrying the ball 17 times for 87 yards.

Aquinas outgained the visitors in total offense, 375-132 and collected 20 first downs to Linton's four.

Coach Bob Rosmarino, forced to start several juniors because of injuries, found that he had considerable depth in his re-
