### Aquinas Group Hear Candidate On Vietnam

Student demonstrators against the war in Vietnam may be prolonging the conflict they want ended, Stephen May told a student assembly at Aquinas Institute Tuesday. The Republican candidate for Rochester City Council, who visited Vietnam last winter, defended the right of students and other groups to criticize America's involvement, but scolded those who are "blatantly" against our mission there and who haven't thought through the repercussions overseas of their activities.

"Whether we like it or not," May said, "we must recognize that Vietnam has become the testing ground for America's will and ability to frustrate Communist China's export of revolutionary warfare. It is merely the beginning of a long and difficult struggle to block Red Chinese expansionism. This effort will require patience, understanding and sacrifices on our part, plus considerably more help from our free world allies."

He said that "unfortunately" student demonstrators may well be working against the peace they seek because they transmit the impression to Hanoi that the American people are seriously divided on this issue and that we may eventually pull out and leave South Vietnam to the communists.

A friend who lost a family member some months ago, recently remarked, "I'm glad November is almost here, so Frank can share in the prayers and Masses his friends and relatives will be offering for the Holy Souls."

"People were wonderful at the time of Frank's death," she went on. "They called and had Masses said, but people do forget. It's only natural."

And as a special reminder, in late October she mailed to close friends an extra copy of the little card printed at the time of Frank's death, with a short note asking for his inclusion in their prayers during the month dedicated to the departed.

**Morbid?**

"Do you think this seems morbid?" she asked us anxiously.

Far from a morbid gesture, this, to our way of thinking, was the "holy and wholesome thought" carried into direct action. Prayer is something we all can and should do for those who have died. We were glad to be reminded in this gentle way. Our friend, still saddened, has nevertheless recovered from the initial shock and is handling her life in a thoroughly Christian manner.

Men and women — and boys and girls, too — have, during the upcoming month of November, the privilege of participating with the Church in the pious and charitable custom of praying for the souls in purgatory.

Caught up in the fast-paced and somewhat materialistic atmosphere in which most of us live, it would be so easy — so "natural" as our friend said — to overlook or postpone intensive prayer for the dead.

But, thanks to Mother Church who knows human nature so well, this one month out of 12 is set aside for this very purpose — remembering, and "doing something about it."

Mass on Sunday morning will be at 8 a.m. with Masses on Monday and Tuesday starting at 6:45 a.m.

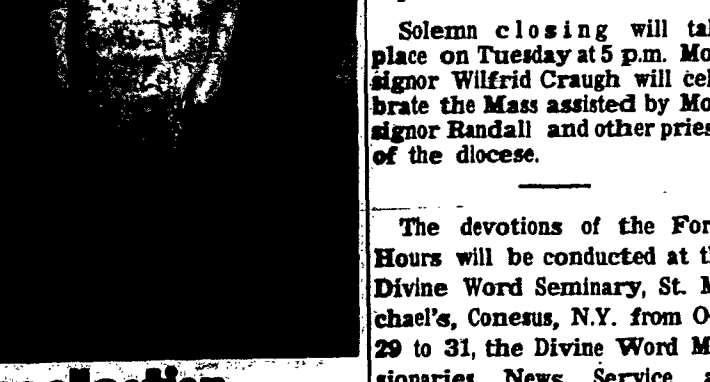
