

# Golden Jubilee Celebrated At St. John's School, Clyde

Clyde—St. John's School, conducted by the Sisters of Mercy, celebrated its Golden Jubilee at a weekend celebration Oct. 23-24, with 656 alumni, wives and friends sharing a buffet supper at Clyde Central School. The school, the first parochial school in Wayne County, was established by Father John Gleeson in 1914, and had its first graduating class in 1915.

At Saturday's celebration the Rev. Paul Cuddy, pastor of St. John's, and Frank A. 'Plug' DiRenzo welcomed the gathering which filled the auditorium to overflowing for the program. Principal Douglas Estes of Clyde Central extended felicitations and Miss Alice Foley, president of the N.Y. State Teachers Association, and an alumna of 1919, was the main speaker.

Remarking that the work has completely changed in the past 20 and 10 years, she described an educational conference in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia where nearly 400 delegates from over 60 countries discussed educational problems.

The speaker said: "While there is great poverty and hunger among the people of many nations, they are more hungry for education than for food. Unfortunately too many have the idea that education in itself is the cure for all their troubles. It is not that simple. We no longer live in a world where we in the United States

can exist unmindful of all these millions of people.

"As I travelled through countries in the East I was impressed by the fact that in many countries we are not greatly loved. Our children will live in a world in which they must be intimately concerned with the thoughts and the lives of millions who less than a generation ago were remote realities. The awesome future of our children in a complex world must be prepared for in their education today."

A highlight of the program was the recognition of Dr. and Mrs. John L. Pulvino. In presenting them, Father Cuddy said: "For 31 years Dr. and Mrs. Pulvino have been an outstanding doctor and nurse team in the care of our local Sisters of Mercy. Both have served with medical skill and with their hearts. I have never had the opportunity to express the thanks of the whole parish for this care. I do so tonight."

The assembly rose for a long standing ovation. Congratulatory wires were read from Bishop James E. Kearney, Congressman Frank Horton, Assemblyman Joseph Finley, Senator Thomas Laverne, and Senator Robert Kennedy.

Frank Fennel's orchestra played for the dance which followed in the gymnasium until 1 p.m.

A special Jubilee Mass was celebrated Sunday at 12 noon by former assistant Father Walter Fleming. Alumni who were former altar boys served the Mass including V. Edward Burke, Carol Palumbo, Raymond Castellano, and the local Nicholas DiLeo, Howard Marchitelli, James Boyce, Nicholas Manno and six high school students.

Forty nuns headed by Mother Mary Bride, Mother General of the Sisters of Mercy, Rochester, were guests of honor. All the Sisters received Holy Communion at the Mass in a liturgical act of unity and charity. St. John's School Choir sang an English translation of Montani's "Missa Brevis."

At 3 p.m., St. John's School children presented to a crowded auditorium at Clyde Central School, "Fifty Golden Years." Miss Kathleen Burke, '62, was accompanist; Sisters John Bosco and Eucharistia were the directors. A buffet lunch for the 40 Sisters was served at the parish hall by the women of the parish under the supervision of Mrs. Bruce Born.

## Churchill Talk Listed By Prime Minister's Kin

John Spencer Churchill, author, painter and nephew of the great British war-time Prime Minister, will speak at Nazareth College of Rochester, Tuesday, Nov. 9, at 8 p.m. in the reading room of the Library. His subject will be Sir Winston Churchill: The Man.

A distinguished writer and painter, in his own right, John Spencer Churchill was in intimate touch with Sir Winston throughout the great leader's most active years. It was Sir Winston who first encouraged his nephew to paint and inspired him to write.

In his younger years, the two Churchill families were frequent visitors together at Blenheim (the famed Marlborough Palace); more recently he has spent much time at Chartwell; Sir Winston's own home for which Lady Churchill commissioned Joseph Spencer to paint a mural for the uncle's 75th birthday. The uncle and nephew often painted together.

John Spencer Churchill is well known as a raconteur with a lively sense of humor and a flair for colorful anecdote. Many have described his eloquence and resonant voice as typically Churchillian. He deals with the living stuff of historical event and shares his uncle's dual ability to describe events in the sonorous phrase—and to expose pretense and humbug with a mordant quip.

Born in 1909, the son of Sir Winston's younger brother, he is a grandson of Lord Randolph Churchill and his American
