Academy by a score of 14-13 before more than 5,000 home-coming fans. It was ND's 6th straight win after an opening 13-13 tie with Elmira Southside.

Keys to the Crusader's victory were Jack Leonard's placement kicks after each of ND's touchdowns.

Joe Cascio broke the scoring ice early in the second quarter by picking up an Academy fumble and racing 33 yards for the score. The play was a pitchout from quarterback Mickey Harrigan; halfback Ron Gilliam, who apparently thought it was an incomplete pass as he ran by the ball without making an effort to pick it up.

In the same period, Notre Dame's Dave Merriam came around and took a hand off from quarterback Mike Amiano and threw a perfect pass to the other end, Don Carmody, in the end zone.

In the second half, the Blue Devils roared back with two

touchdowns. After Bob Eyres and George Mekos carried the team to the ND 18, Harrigan faked to them, found Chris Biggs alone in the end zone and fired an 18-yard TD pass. The second score came on a 9 yard scamper by Eyres after he fumbled and Sarge Edsall carried the Devils downfield.

Ed Hawkes, Academy's place kicker, almost had the game tied up, but his first attempt was nullified by a penalty.

His second try from the 9 was wide.

Hawkes had one more opportunity. With less than two minutes to go, the Academy moved to the ND 38. With just 5 seconds left, Hawkes tried a 56 yard field goal. The ball dropped in the end zone and the clock ran out.

During halftime, Notre Dame's Delores Leach was crowned Homecoming Queen. The other three contestants were Peg Johnson, Barb Anderson and Cathy Heppe.

Mooney Faces Kearney Sunday

The strong football teams of Cardinal Mooney High and Bishop Kearney High will square off at Aquinas Stadium this Sunday at 2 p.m. in a neighborhood rivalry already becoming a tradition. Now in their fourth year of competition, both teams bring identical 4-2 records into the game.

Bishop Kearney, coached by Dan Coughlin, has won 4 games this season including their big win over the Irish of Aquinas Institute. The Kings have suffered losses to Notre Dame of Elmira, 7-6 and to Bishop Gibbons of Schenectady, 21-14. Coach Coughlin's well drilled squad a fine defense spearheaded by a big rugged line and a fine speedy secondary. Linebacker Dan O'Berst and tough Larry Moran have shone on defense for the Kearney men. Offensively, the Kings rely on quarterback Phil Smith to spearhead their attack. Mike Werner, who starred in last year's contest, is also back.

The Tony Merola-coached Mooney club has also chalked up 4 wins, including an opening season victory over McQuaid. The Cards suffered losses at the hands of Aquinas 12 to 7 and Batavia High 20 to 12. Mooney's running attack has featured Dick Musclove and Bill Walker carrying the ball most of the time while the boys up front doing the job have been Jerry Brien, George Lord, Dave Sikes and John Merkell. The quarterback honors have been shared by brothers Ken and Jim Harrington.

Dick Musclove has been named Most Valuable Player for his leadership in the team's offense against Kearney on Sunday.

St. Francis Tops McQuaid 25 to 12

St. Francis of Athol Springs gave McQuaid a lesson in cold-weather football last Friday night at Lackawanna Stadium when they dumped the Knights, 25-12. The loss, suffered in freezing temperatures, left the Knights' record at 2-5.

This Saturday they will meet Jamestown at home in their finale of what has been an off-and-on season.

St. Francis jumped off to an early lead, scoring on their first play from scrimmage. After a short McQuaid punt, Raider fullback Ron Currie skirted right end for 42 yards and a TD. A successful conversion made it 7-0.

Again, in the third quarter, the Raiders drove 69 yards for a TD, sparked by Jim Cross's 37-yard toss to Mike Fitzgerald. Dick Job zig-zagged past McQuaid's secondary to score from the 21. When the Knights had to punt, Fitzgerald snared two more passes for 30 and 23 yards, the second for a touchdown. The extra point failed, but the Raiders had a 19-0 lead at the three-quarter mark.

In the fourth period the Knights finally started to roll and drove 61 yards in 6 plays for a score. Mark Schiller carried for 46 of the yards and rumbled over from the 4. However, St. Francis came right back with 6 points, with Job scooting over from the 18 to make it 25-6.

In the game's waning moments, with Steve Hromjak at quarterback, McQuaid scored again on a 13-yard pass from Hromjak to end Dave Atwell.

On a brighter note last week, McQuaid's J.V. squad came up with its top performance of the season to defeat Bishop Kearney's J.V., 14-7. Bob DiPaola and Bob Carr scored for the Knights.

Aquinas Institute, stymied by stubborn Bishop Walsh High of Elmira in the first half last Sunday, combined a powerful offense with an even more powerful defense in the final quarter to defeat the Eagles 13-7.

A wet crowd—it rained intermittently while the winds blew in gusts up to 40 miles per hour—watched as the Irish showed over two touchdowns in the final period to boost their season's record to 5 wins against one loss.

While the cheering went to the ball-carrying of Pat DiNicola who racked up 152 yards in 26 carries—along with the all-round generalship of quarterback Craig Englert—much of the credit for the victory belongs to the Aquinas defensive unit.

So rugged was the Irish defense the Eagles failed to check in with a single first down in the second half and managed only two in the first half. Aquinas held Walsh to a mere 37 yards rushing and 30 yards via the airarms.

The Irish picked up 188 yards rushing and passed for 35 yards. Aquinas also had the advantage in first downs, 11 to 2.

Things looked bad for Aquinas at first. The Eagles struck early in the game for a 7-0 advantage. On the second play following the game opening kickoff Englert was hit hard and bobbed the ball. Walsh's Jim Anastasio was there and hopped on the ball at the Aquinas 12. On the next play Pat Southworth took a pass from John Shine and scooted 12 yards. Brian Campe's successful PAT kick made it 7-0 for Walsh within 50 seconds of the opening whistle.

Late in the third quarter John Shine of Walsh failed to connect on a fourth down pass and Aquinas took over on their own 26-yard line. Don Cannioti, who has been on the injured list since the Bishop Kearney game, entered the game for the last play of the third period and moved the ball five yards. Pat DiNicola streaked around end 21 yards for the first Aquinas tally. DiNicola's successful PAT run made it 7-7 as the last quarter started.

A fumble set up the winning touchdown of the game. Little Al Troita, who had been a giant on defense throughout the game, pounced on an Eagle fumble midway through the last quarter. From the next eleven plays—which were the highlight of Aquinas' offense, the Irish moved the ball to the Walsh 10. Pat Graham went for the TD after a sensational shoestring catch from Englert.

Mooney's record now is 4 wins and 2 losses for the season.

Fisher Harriers Wind Up with .500 Season

Handicapped by the absence of Tim Boland and John Fitzgerald, both sidelined by illness, St. John Fisher's cross-country team finished next to last in the Canisius Invitational meet held in Buffalo Saturday. It was the last outing of the season for the Cardinals.

The Fisher harriers also were at Canisius last Wednesday for a dual meet against the Griffins. The Cardinals won by a 28-33 score, with Boland and Fitzgerald finishing second and third, respectively.

Only the failure of several of last year's outstanding runners to come out for the 1965 squad prevented the Fisher cross-country team from showing better than a .500 average for the

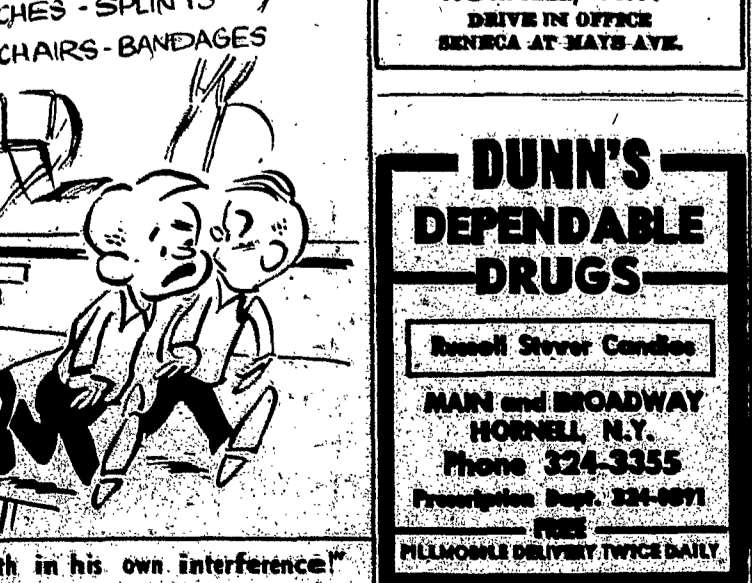
