'White Ghetto' Outlook Noted

Ithaca—Ithaca College Newmanites heard a panel discussion on "The Negro in the 50's and 70's" recently in Egbert College Union here. The panel members, all from Rochester, were Mrs. Alma Greene, a Negro member of the Urban Renewal Commission in Rochester, Mr. Louis Martin, vice-president of the Catholic Interracial Council, and Father Robert Kanka, the associate editor of the Rochester Catholic Courier-Journal.

Mrs. Greene reviewed the contributions Negroes have made to America and noted that they have been systematically excluded from American life. Some few Negroes have developed pride and dignity but it is hard for them to find information to back it up; our history books make small mention of the Negro. Our Constitution says basic rights don't have "to be earned" and the Negro is only asking for the chance to develop himself to his greatest capability. Mrs. Greene also pointed out that integration does not mean intermarriage.

In the question period, Martin and Mrs. Greene pointed out that today's militant Negro is no longer concerned with what whites think of his methods to attain his rights, and unless we realize that he is no longer asking but demanding the implementation of laws already in existence, America may reach a point of greater conflict in the years ahead.

Martin emphasized that Catholics must recognize that they can't do much for the Negro. Rather, their efforts should help create the conditions whereby the Negro can help himself. It cannot be the old settlement house technique where clothes and welfare allotments are given out. The Negro must have power and the white community must give it to him. Louis Martin quoted from James Baldwin: "I don't ask you for your love, just get off my back!"

Some few Negroes have developed pride and dignity but it is hard for them to find information to back it up; our history books make small mention of the Negro. College Adds Electronics Unit

The manufacturer, Tektronix, Inc., of Beaverton, Ore., applied a grant of \$1,480 toward the purchase price of the seven instruments.
