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Todd's 'Martin Luther' Reviewed by Mary Bush

John Todd's Martin Luther is a "middle way" approach, well suited for these ecumenical times, said Dr. Mary Bush in a Monday Book Review program last week.

"Previous authors have painted Luther as all black or all white," she noted, while Todd tries to interpret the controversial Luther, without being either partisan or derogatory.

Todd feels that Luther's inner emotional struggles—he was troubled with depression and religious scruples, are not the whole answer by any means, to his break with the Catholic Church. Some critics have argued this, noted Miss Bush.

There is still the whole problem of objective abuses. Todd denies that Luther was "a revolutionist," was rather a man bent on reforming what he considered to be faulty Church practices and some theological abuses. Gradually, he attacked the Church's teachings, and finally rejected Papal authority.

Author Todd points out that many of the liturgical reforms advocated by Luther have now been put into practice by the Catholic Church.

Miss Bush, of Nazareth Col.

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lege's History department, felt that Todd's treatment was "something of an ecumenical breakthrough," and a book popular in style which would undoubtedly have a wide reading.

The review was the third in the current series held at the Catholic Evidence Library and sponsored by the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women.

Teenagers Told Rise above Group

Chicago—(NC)—A Dominican priest appealed here to Catholic teenagers at their national convention to rise above the group, to work to be persons of distinction.

Speaking at a session of the eighth national convention of the National Catholic Youth Federation, Father Richard Butler, O.P., of Chicago said:

"You dress alike and you talk the same jargon and you like the same icky-sticky songs and you have the same goals and ideals—the big car, the big blast, the big ball, the big time, the free ride from here to eternity. Get out of it. Stop kidding yourself."

"This is not only a dangerous time of conformity," he warned, "but also one of reducing everyone to the lowest common denominator: the age of the mythical common man."

Advertisers catering to teenagers, he said, know teenagers permit themselves to be cut from the same mold and to be disinterested in distinction.

Consequently, he continued, one major advertising firm advised its clients that "a man no longer has to be something—he need only to possess the symbols of that being."

Businesses were advised by this advertising company "to increase proliferation of brands with special personalities with which people can achieve identity-by-association and thus further their chances of standing out from the faceless crowd," he said.

Father Butler, a former national director of the U.S. Newman Apostolate and now provincial director for the Newman Apostolate for the Dominican Order, told his audience: "You don't need consumption or the symbols of consumption to set you apart from the crowd."
