 "The biggest gain in having such hospital treatment available has been the avoidance of many heartaches on the part of alcoholics and their families," he feels. Without a hospital willing to admit patients suffering from acute alcoholism, there is often no recourse but jail, he points out.

Lexington—(RNS)—A book designed to strengthen church ministry in Southern Appalachia has been written by a United Presbyterian missionary who spent the past 13 years in the midst of the poverty and desperation of mountain people.

Author of the 160-page "Yesterday's People" is the Rev. Jack E. Weller, minister-at-large for the denomination's Ebenezer Presbytery. For a long time he served as a pastor, and later director, of the Presbyterian West Virginia Mountain Project, which combines a social and religious ministry in Appalachia.

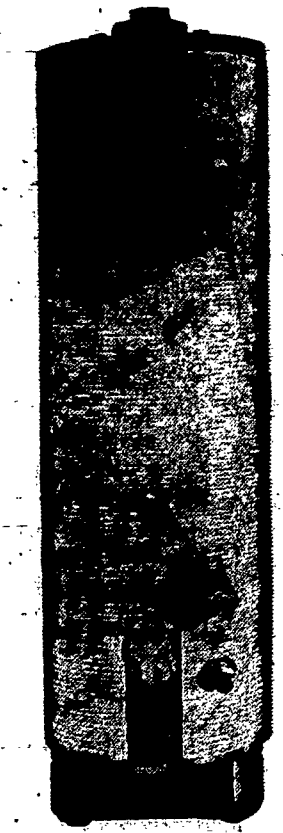
