### Medals for Aid To Refugees

Dayton—(NC)—Twelve commemorative medals from a Vietnamese bishop will be distributed in the Dayton area to supporters of a program which aids refugees in the war-ravaged nation.

Bishop Hoang van Doan of Qui-Nhon sent the medals from Rome to Mrs. Thomas K. Engel of Our Lady of Good Hope parish, Miamisburg, founder of the Vietnam Solidarity Movement.

Mrs. Engel said the medals, intended as "Christmas gifts of thanks" to the residents of the Dayton area who have responded to the needs of Vietnamese refugees, will be presented early in January.

Bishop Hoang van Doan is the spiritual leader in a province along the coast in central Vietnam, among the areas hardest hit by the Vietcong, according to Mrs. Engel.

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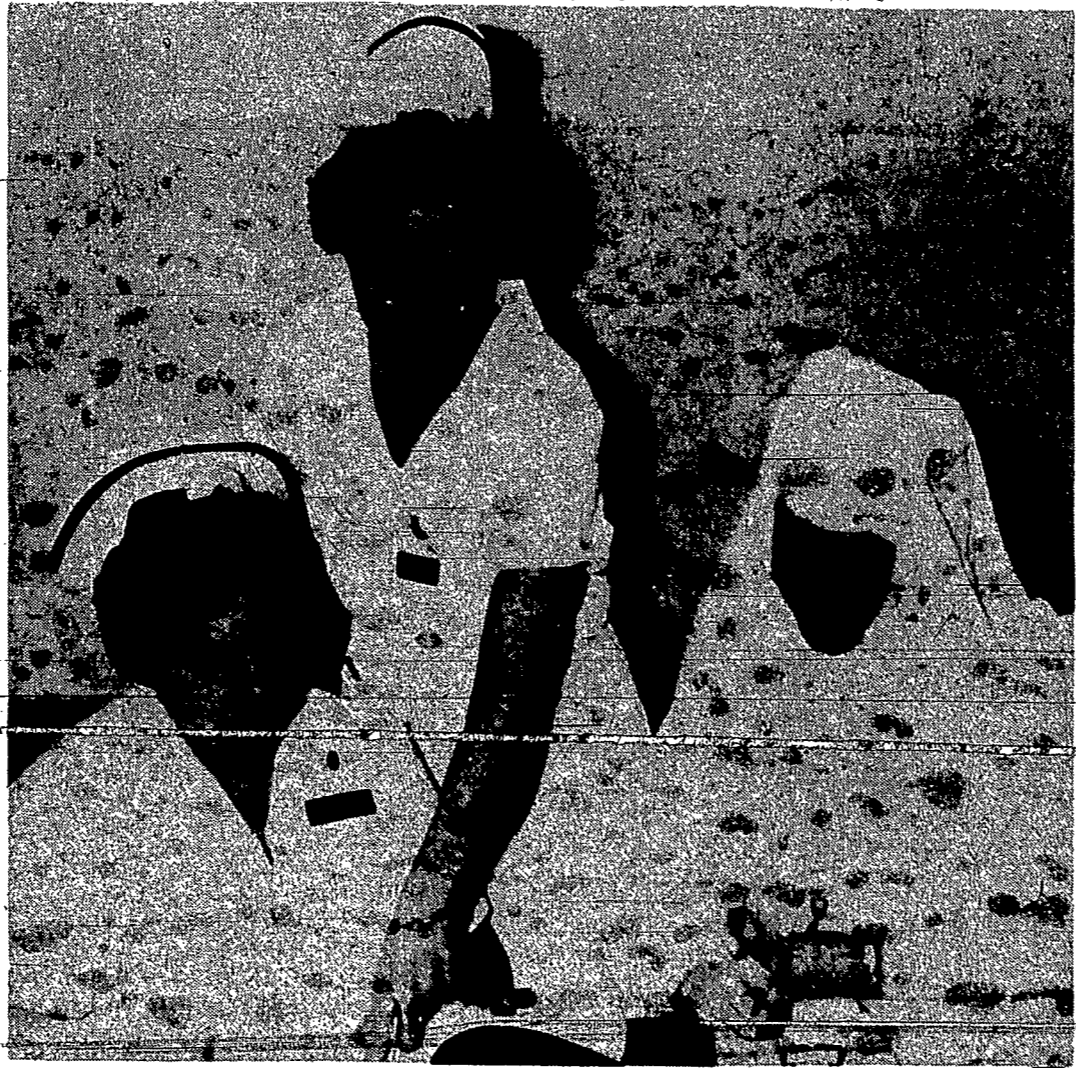

## Slate Refresher Course at St. Ann's

Another Refresher Program for registered professional nurses will begin Monday, Jan. 24, at St. Ann's Home, 1500 Portland Ave. The course is sponsored by the Rochester Regional Hospital Council and the six local hospitals.

The program will be offered for a period of six weeks. The first four weeks will consist of lectures, demonstrations, practice and clinical experience at St. Ann's Home, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The last two weeks will consist of clinical experience in the hospital and in the nursing specialty of the individual nurse's choice.

The aim of the program is to motivate and encourage valuable members of the health team to return to active nursing.

Interested inactive nurses who are planning to return to active nursing now, either full or part-time, may register for the program by calling Sister Karen, director of nursing at St. Ann's Home (FI 2-1700).

## Jobs Asked For Unskilled At Cathedral

San Francisco—(RNS)—The Archdiocese of San Francisco's Catholic Interracial Council announced here a program which would allow training of untrained, but qualified individuals, many of whom are minority persons, in the building of this city's new multi-million dollar cathedral.

The council urged that a "pre-apprenticeship" or "job training program in specific trades during the course of the construction of the cathedral," be adopted by the Archdiocese.

Details of the program and the effect on the unions was outlined by Richard B. Morris, a San Francisco attorney and Council president.

Morris noted that in the council's discussions with Archbishop Joseph T. McGuiken the prelate had given his "attentive consideration" to the CIC's program. Mr. Morris said he had "great confidence" in the archdiocese's adopting his group's plan.

Asked if the CIC of the Archdiocese of San Francisco would advocate not building the new cathedral if it was to be constructed by contractors and unions which discriminated against minority workers, Morris replied "yes."

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## Fisher Reaches To Wider Area

Four years ago, nine out of every ten students at St. John Fisher College were Monroe County residents.

Today, every third student registered is from outside the county; in the freshman and sophomore classes there are four out-of-towners for every six local youths.

These and other figures were made known this week in the Annual Fall Registration Report published by the Registrar's Office at the college.

In a total enrollment of 1011 full-time students, 760 are from the 12-county Catholic Diocese of Rochester. Monroe County residents number 875. Erie County, with 38 students, represents the next largest group by county, followed by Oneida County with 22.

Six per cent of Fisher's current student body comes from outside New York State. For the freshman class this figure is 8.5 per cent. The neighboring states of New Jersey (20 students), Connecticut (9), and Pennsylvania (7) supply more than half of the non-New Yorkers. Residents of 11 states and 5 foreign countries are enrolled.

Included in the overall total of 1011 students are 330 freshmen; 334 sophomores, 203 juniors, and 144 seniors. In addition, there are 77 girls from Nazareth College enrolled in one or more courses at St. John Fisher.

Approximately 80 per cent of Fisher students are candidates for bachelor of arts degrees, with the remaining 40 per cent almost evenly divided between bachelor of science and bachelor of business administration aspirants.

Although accounting (125), English (125), and history (122) majors constitute the largest single blocs by major subject, science majors collectively represent the fastest growing group at the college. At present there are 107 biology majors, 75 in chemistry, and 39 in physics.

Diocesan seminarians enrolled as regular full-time Fisher students number 81. There also are 29 Basilian scholastics now studying at the college.

Dormitory residents number 193. Another 108 students from distant locations live in off-campus housing, including approximately forty in the Manger Hotel. Six hundred commuters make up the bulk of the Fisher enrollment.

## Donovan, Kinsella Given Auburn 'Mr. Knight' Title

Auburn—Past Grand Knight Eugene C. Donovan and John J. Kinsella were named "Mr. Knight" for the past year by Auburn Council 207 Knights of Columbus.

The announcement was made by the selection committee composed of Raymond Glancy, Francis C. Cuddy, Clarence W. Nolan, Philip J. Conboy, Luke J. Bergan, Edward F. Secaur, Frederick H. Woods, Avery E. Neagle, all past grand knights and Clarence T. Hoey.

The awards to the two honored knights will be made Saturday evening, Jan. 15 at a dinner at the K. of C. Home. Conboy has been made chairman of the affair.

Donovan was initiated into the council on Oct. 7, 1909. He served as grand knight for two terms, 1920-1922. He was then appointed district deputy and held that office for three terms.

Kinsella became a knight on Nov. 21, 1918 and has been an active member of the council ever since. He also served as a trustee of the council for many years.

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
