

# Mooney Third In Holiday Meet

Cardinal Mooney High School placed third in the Greece Holiday Tournament by losing to Greece Olympia 55-51 and bouncing back to defeat Greece Arcadia 52-35. The two game series brought the Cardinal record to 6 wins against 3 losses for the season.

In the first game of the tournament, the Cardinals were defeated by a tough Olympia ball club. Olympia, displaying fine ball handling, dominated the boards throughout the game. Mooney led at half time 33-31. Olympia came back with a strong 4th period drive, outscoring the Cards 12 to 5, to take the verdict. For Mooney, Jim Harrington and Terry Mur-

phy had 12 points each while Jim Garrett had 11. DeCristofaro led Olympia with 20 points while Payne and Dan Murphy each had 15.

Mooney recovered in the second game to defeat Arcadia 52-35. The Cardinals led at half time 21-16 and slowly pulled away to place the game out of reach of the hustling Arcadians. Terry Murphy paced Mooney with 19 points while Otis Davis had 11. John Rabish had 14 for Arcadia.

# McQuaid Finds NYC Inhospitable

 Though they flashed some of their best form of the season, McQuaid's varsity cagers wound up on the short end of both their starts in the annual Jesuit High Schools Tournament at Fordham University last week.

Facing tourney favorite St. Peter's Prep of Jersey City after drawing an opening round bye, the Knights bowed by a 72-54 score. The next night, they put on a 58 per cent shooting exhibition led by junior John Koller, but fell before an equally hot Regis High team, 62-67, in a seven-game struggle. The tournament went to host team Fordham Prep, which upset St. Peter's, 50-47, in a great defensive battle.

Koller gained All-Tournament honors for his 43-point total in the two games and will be out to continue his high-scoring

ways tonight (Friday) at Water town, a court that McQuaid has not played on in the past.

McQuaid, now 4-4, should stay above the 500 mark against the Cyclones if it can continue the progress that he demonstrated in New York. Center Ray Sherbinski was in a double figure both times, hitting for 11 and 13 and grabbing 15 rebounds in the St. Peter's game. It was his 3-point jump midway in the second period of that game which gave McQuaid a 28-27 lead over the favored Marauders, who jumped off to a quick 7-1 edge.

A cold spell left McQuaid trailing 35-30 at the half and an 18-9 deficit in the third period all but decided the final outcome.

In the consolation game against Regis, the Knights rallied from a 31-19 deficit to

move ahead of the New Yorkers, 52-50, as the third quarter ended. Sherbinski and Bob Weingartner had done the scoring in the second period and Koller, who had an 11-for-15 night from the field, took over after intermission as McQuaid made its victory bid. Senior guard Tom Blake played a major role, too, despite three personal fouls in the opening quarter. Blake, who had balanced miscues and assists the previous night, turned in a steady ball-handling and play-making job to spark the Knights' offense most of the way.

But another barren stretch early in the last period changed McQuaid's narrow lead into a 6-point Regis lead that a final McQuaid flurry could not erase. Two baskets by Blake and Koller within 15-seconds closed the gap to 68-67 with 35 sec-

onds to go, but Regis got two good shots and made them for the clinching points.

While the varsity was in New York, McQuaid's J.V. squad sought to defend its title in the Rush-Henrietta tournament, but had to settle for third place. The Knights were slumped by Bishop Kearney, 46-38, but came back the next night to roll over Rush-Henrietta, 64-46, as Bob Comparato hit for 18 and freshman center Nick Combs collected a season high of 22. The J.V. record stands now at 5-3.

## Jubilarian, A Man Of Seven Sacraments

Los Angeles—(NC)—Jesuit Father Francis X. Farmer is one of the "old breed."

He's a former Methodist minister, an old China hand, a widower, a Jesuit, a man who has received all seven Sacraments.

Come Jan. 8, and he will celebrate his golden jubilee as a Jesuit. The celebration will take place at Loyola University of Los Angeles where he has been stationed for the past 17 years.

Father Farmer was born in Georgia 88 years ago in 1901 he went to China as a Methodist missionary. Two years later he married a missionary confere, Martha Beeson. After her death in 1911 he wrote her biography, "A Missionary Heroine of Kwang Si."

After 13 years' as a Methodist missionary in China, he was received into the Catholic Church May 6, 1915 at Savannah, Ga.

Eight months later he joined the Society of Jesus at Canterbury, England, and was ordained in 1922 in Hastings, England.

For the next 27 years he worked as a parish priest in Shanghai.

In 1949 Father Farmer came here to Loyola as spiritual father to the faculty and religious community. He is in good health, although during a serious illness he received the Anointing of the Sick.

## Layman Heads Montreal Univ.

Montreal—(NC)—Paul Emile, administrator of the Ayer-Cardinal Leger of Montreal formally invested Roger Gaudry as the first layman rector of the University of Montreal at a colorful and historic ceremony here.

Cardinal Leger acted in his capacity as chancellor of the university which, since its formation, had always been directed by a priest-educated.

Gaudry, 52, a biochemist, has



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
