London—(RNS)—Father Camillus Nolan, C.P., one of six priests and three Brothers from the English Passionists' Province working in Sweden, looks over the vast area of their mission land. He was in London to raise funds for the erection of a new church at Johnkoping, on the highway between Stockholm and Malmo. The British Passionists have been in Sweden for 13 years and now have four permanent houses, with improvised chapels, and 26 Mass centers. They minister to about 26,000 Catholics. With a total population of some 7.6 million, Sweden is a predominantly Lutheran nation. Catholics in the whole country number only about 37,000.

LBJ Birth Control Views Awaited

Washington—(NC)—In 25 words in his State of the Union Message a little more or less than a year ago President Johnson touched off a major national controversy over birth control.

The question now in many minds is whether Mr. Johnson, in his 1966 message, will choose to fan the debate's flames or damp them down. Many here are predicting increased efforts in Congress and the executive branch to involve the federal government in foreign and domestic birth control programs.

The issue of government-supported birth control has been simmering on a back burner for several years before the President's 1965 State of the Union Message. But Mr. Johnson's remarks on that occasion last Jan. 4 moved it up to the front of the stove.

"I will seek new ways," he said, "to use our knowledge to help deal with the explosion in world population and the growing scarcity in world resources."

Mr. Johnson returned briefly to the same theme in several other public utterances in the intervening months. In August,

for example, in a message to United Nations Secretary General U Thant in connection with the UN Conference on World Population in Belgrade, he called the balancing of world resources and world population a "transcendent problem" and said: "Second only to the search for peace, it is humanity's greatest challenge."

Now attention is focused on the 1966 State of the Union Message, scheduled for delivery Jan. 10. The question is whether Mr. Johnson intends to make specific proposals and, if so, how hard he will push for them.

Those who advocate government birth control have not, however, simply been waiting on the President for the past year. Instead they have conducted a hard-driving and skillful campaign to enlarge the government's already substantial role in this field.

A major objective has been to create a national "consensus"—or at least its semblance—in favor of government birth control.
