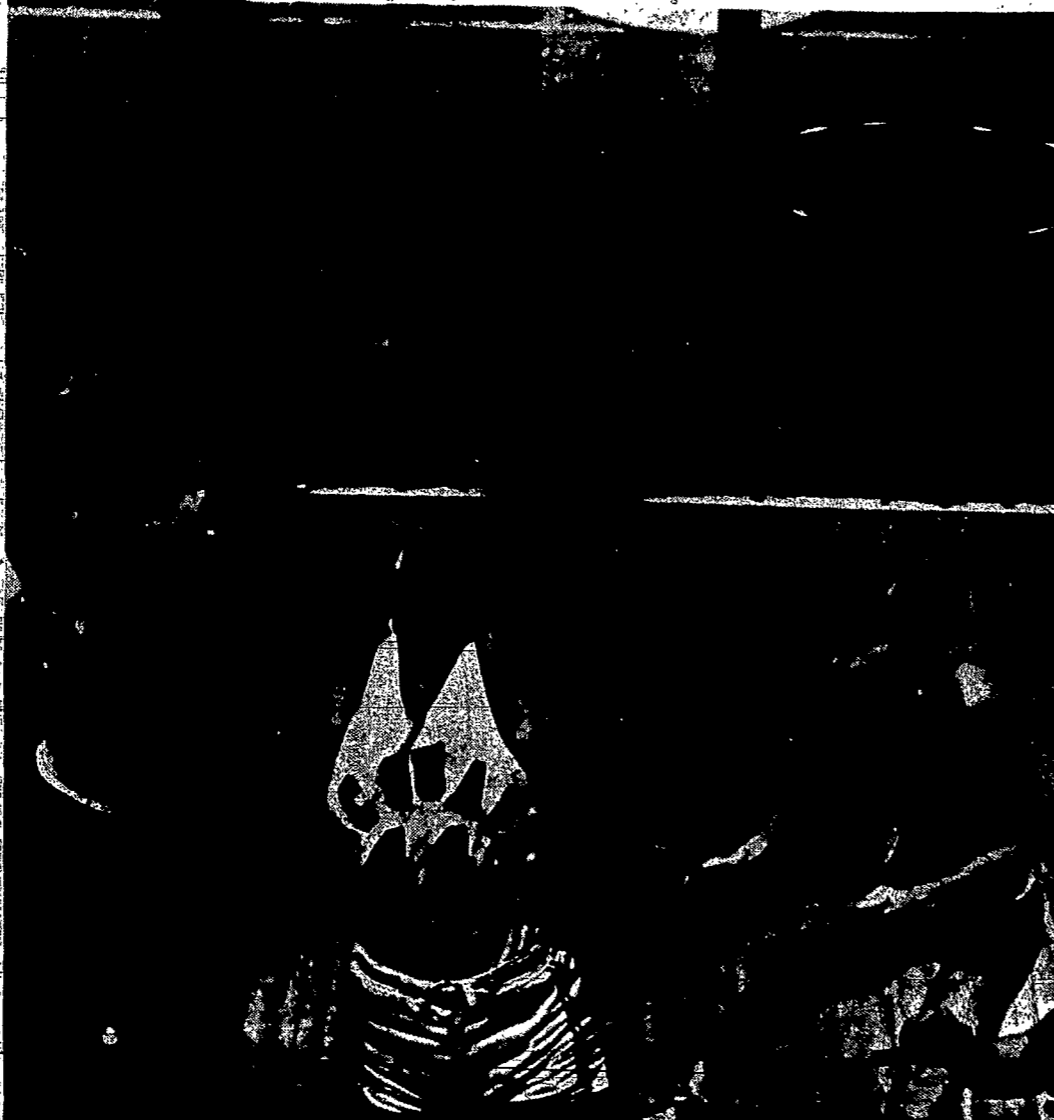


Seminary 5 Trips Harley

With Tom Capriotti and Foss directing a ball control game, the Sems stayed ahead but saw their margin cut to three points starting the fourth quarter. Free Throws Sink Fisher

Accuracy at the free throw line made the difference in the final score as Fredonia State College defeated St. John Fisher at Fredonia Saturday, 80-71. The Cardinals outscored the winners from the floor, dunking 31 goals to 30 for the Blue Devils, but Fredonia's 20 points via charity tosses to only nine for Fisher gave them a comfortable margin of victory.

At one time in the first period, Fisher had a five-point lead, but by halftime the Cards trailed 34-28.

Ed Harvey's 20 points spearheaded the Fredonia scoring attack. Jim Coaler and Dick Segerdahl each threw in 17 for the winners.

Jim Charles with 18 points paced St. John Fisher. Captain Brendan Carmody added 11, while John Fitzgerald and Bob Krist contributed 10 points each to the Cardinals' cause.

Because of semester examinations the Fisher hoopsters will not play again until Jan. 29 when they resume action against Plattsburg State.

McQuaid Subdues Mt. Carmel, 75-65

Maintaining a slight advantage throughout most of the game, McQuaid Jesuit High turned back Mt. Carmel of Auburn, 75-65, in the McQuaid gym last Friday.

John Koller opened for the Knights with a layup and the teams traded baskets until a five-point spurge midway through the first period gave McQuaid a 15-10 edge. After trailing by 21-18 after one quarter, Mt. Carmel rallied, and five free throws by Tom Triggillo gave them a 28-27 lead. Tom Miller's two free throws put the Knights ahead to stay, and they were up, 37-32, at halftime.

Koller again proved to be the

spark in the third period, as he flipped in 13 of his team's 21 points to hike the Knights' lead to 58-49. In the fourth stanza it was Koller again, aided by Tom Gibson and Bob Weingartner, who helped put the Knights up by 14, with two minutes remaining. Coach Ken Jones substituted freely after this, but seven foul shots by the Auburn Five were too late to make the difference.

Koller finished with a career high of 29 points and now has 78 points in his last 3 games. His 13 for 38 from the field was a good chunk of McQuaid's 41% shooting mark. Weingartner added 14 points and Tom Blake chipped in with 10. Blake also contributed a dozen assists

for Mt. Carmel, Jim Gagnier was tops with 18, considerably less than the 35 he had rung up against Mooney the previous week. John La Douce netted 14, while Dick Solomon and Tom Triggillo garnered 10 apiece.

In the J.V. opener, McQuaid roared to a 36-11 halftime lead, and coasted to a 54-25 victory over the Carmel Juniors. The Squires also defeated Brockport by 10 points the following night to up their record to 7-3. Bob Comparato and Kevin Dwyer were the scoring leaders in the two wins.

McQuaid's freshman squad stayed on the victory path, too, with a pair of wins over Franklin and Brockport. Pat Laveck and Bob Madden took scoring laurels for the Pages, who now have a .82 record.

Crusaders Ride High, Now Sport 8-1 Record

In the third and fourth periods, the Crusaders kept building up their lead. In the final quarter, the victors scored 28 points out of 57 attempts. Southside's 18 for 50 ended in a 36 per cent shooting performance.

The Crusaders Jayvees led by Arnie Westvelt, remained undefeated by a 55-50 overtime victory. Tied at 48-48 at the end of four periods, Westvelt put in 4 points to lead his team to victory.

Aquinas Cagers Top Canandaigua

That's what Aquinas basketball coach Jack Kelly said following his team's squeak victory over Canandaigua Academy last week. The Irish posted a 50-46 win over the Academy to avenge an earlier defeat by the Braves.

Aquinas ran the visitors off

the court in the first half of the game, outshooting, outrebounding and outlasting the Academy to take a 15-5 lead at the end of the first quarter. Even substituting freely in the second period, Kelly's charged 25-13 at the intermission.

In the second half Canandaigua roared back, looking like a different team. Swapping basket for basket both teams had a 13-point production in the third stanza. The Braves really caught fire in the final canto, outplaying the taller home team and coming within 2 points of the lead before time ran out.

Aquinas' last four victories have been won in the final moments of the game after the Irish took a commanding lead in the first half.

Tom Sullivan was the big gun for Aquinas with a 18-point night. He scored 12 of his total in the first half. Rounding out the twoply scoring was John Laveck who had 10 while collecting 19 rebounds.

Hustling John Elliott hooped 14 points and played his usual strong floor game for Canandaigua. Twelve of his total were scored in the second half. Bob Sheridan tallied 12, 8 in the final two periods.

In junior varsity action Aquinas built up a 33-14 halftime lead and coasted to a 65-31 victory over the Canandaigua juniors. Twelve players scored for Aquinas, led by Peter McGuire's 14 points.

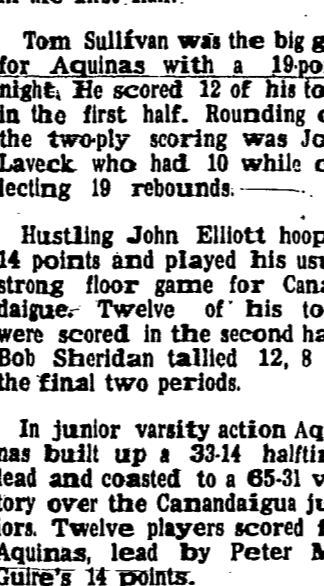
Chancellor In Elmira Talk
