Parish Starts CCD Unit

Holy Spirit parish in Penfield officially established the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine last Friday in a meeting at the Assumption School of Religion in Fairport.

Two hundred men and women of this newly-formed parish volunteered their services to Father Joseph Lynch, their pastor, to provide for the religious education of the children and the adults in this suburban parish.

Twelve are already being trained as Lay Catechists. Helpers and Fishers are also being trained. Some will belong to the Parent-Educator division of the CCD.

Soon Religious Discussion Clubs will be formed for the advanced religious education of the adults. Others will be Apostles of Good Will, who will spread the Catholic faith to the "separated brothers" within the parish limits.

All of the above are guided by an Executive Board of 10 people with Donald Mack as its President.

The CCD, the Church's official canonical organization for teaching religion, will have a religious and spiritual influence on every member of the parish from the cradle to the sick bed.

Inspirational talks were also given by Mrs. Roger Greiten, who is chairman of the Helpers Division of the CCD at St. John's church on Humboldt St. by James Ryder who is vice-president of the same CCD Parish Unit, Sister Teresa Mary, M.H.S.H. and Sister Joseph Marie, M.H.S.H. of the faculty of the Assumption School of Religion and Monsignor Albert H. Schnacky, Diocesan Director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine.

Moral Basis of Peace, Topic For Fisher Talk

Dr. Leslie Dewart, noted author and associate professor of philosophy at St. Michael's College, Toronto, will discuss "The Moral Basis of International Peace Today - Vietnam, etc." at St. John Fisher College Tuesday, Feb. 8, at 7:45 p.m. in St. Basil Hall auditorium. The lecture, open to the public, is the fifth in the 1965-1966 Fisher Philosophy Lecture-Discussion Series. Admission is free.

Dewart's widely reviewed book—*Christianity and Revolution* is an analysis of the philosophical and political issues involved in the Cuban revolt headed by Fidel Castro.
