Civics Club
They Really Do A Job On Catholic Press Month!

The "Sons of Liberty" Civics Club at Mt. Carmel School in Rochester has launched an ambitious month-long program to bring home the message of the Catholic Press.

First step was to send a delegation to get a first hand view of a newspaper being assembled. 10 students with Sister M. Gonzaga, RSM, toured the

Christopher Press last week at the Catholic Courier-Journal. They had a guided tour of the composing room with the explanation by Michael Banskach of its workings.

Second step of the program, under the general chairmanship of Angela Dalesio, was to launch a poster contest on "The Value of the Catholic Press." Contestants not gifted with artistic talent may substitute a 3 minute talk on the topic. Winner will get a one-year subscription to the Courier-Journal; runner-up will get a subscription to Treasure Chest.

Newspaper coverage of current events will be the focus for one week of the campaign. Students will follow the same stories in the daily papers, and compare them in buzz sessions. A panel will sum up the evaluations of the various interest areas at the week's end.

Three guest speakers will appear during the course of Catholic Press Month at Mt. Carmel school.

Miss Blanche Jennings Thompson, well known writer of children's books will discuss the value of poetry on Feb. 8. Mercy High's librarian, Sister Mary Esther, will present an illustrated lecture in mid-February on the proper use of a library. Wisdom in choosing the right book will be part of her topic. Father Robert Kanka, associate editor of the Courier-Journal, will discuss the role of Catholic papers in developing a mature Catholic viewpoint, on Feb. 24.

At this last meeting, Sister Mary Fidelis, Mt. Carmel's principal, will announce the winners of the poster (or speech) contest, according to co-chairman Helene Mulholand.

Principals Meet

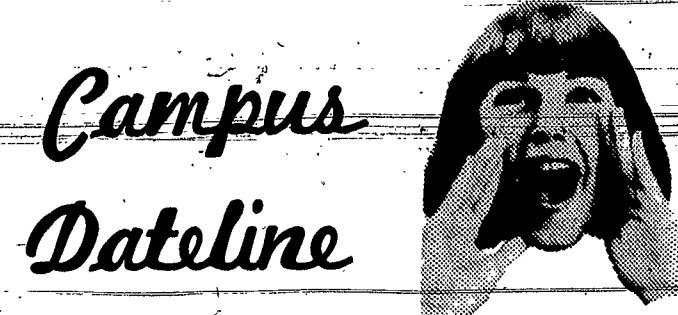

Magazine Campaign

As they plunge into their 1966 Decency in Reading campaign, St. Agnes High School students hope to match their zeal of the last eleven years, which has placed 140,000 copies of Catholic magazines in Rochester area homes.

Directed by Robert Roser and other Catholic Digest representatives, high schoolers from western New York State have in a 15-year period built up an endeavor for the distribution of six Catholic magazines into the promotion of more than 200 intellectual and cultural periodicals. The editorial policy of each participating publication has earned the Audit Bureau assurance of integrity.

"This type of work get under your skin," states Roser, a member of St. Joseph's Parish in Penfield. Thanks to his authentic devotion to the cause of worthwhile reading, it also get "under the skin" of thousands of teen-agers in the Rochester, Buffalo, Syracuse, and Ogdensburg dioceses.

In Rochester, he works with St. Agnes and Nazareth Academy students. Together with the administration and faculty of each school, he turns a "magazine drive" into each student's project, giving them the fun of old-fashioned intramural competition geared to positive apostolic action. The response of St. Agnes High School has earned them the New York State championship for six of their participating eleven years.
