Auburn Youth Canteen--- Where the Action is!

Auburn—The Youth Canteen at St. Alphonsus parish has almost everything that teenagers look for: music with a beat (live or on discs), ping-pong tables and even a bar. (Soda, that is.)

With all this, and special features from time to time, the Canteen, now in its seventh year, is a solid attraction to Auburn teenagers. It's open three Sunday nights a month from 7:30 to 10:30 p.m. in St. Alphonsus school hall.

The Youth Canteen was projected to carry out the wishes of Monsignor Frederick Straub, pastor of St. Alphonsus Church for nearly 35 years. Having already endeared himself to Auburn youth as founder of Camp Columbus, this far-sighted planner had just realized another of his many dreams, the establishment of a Youth Club, in early October 1958, when death overtook him.

"Father Straub wanted planned youth activity," one of the officers of the original Youth Club recalls. "So parents and students, with Fathers Gerald Connor and Robert Kreckel, the assistant pastors, met to plan an initial record hop and establish a treasury for the Club."

Only members of the St. Alphonsus parish can become members, but each member may bring two guests for a small fee, to participate.

With programs planned

monthly by parish student officers, the canteen sponsors three canteen evenings and one special activity, such as bowling and skating parties, picnics, hay rides, and visits to other youth clubs in the diocese. Special religious services are scheduled through the year.

Father Winifred M. Kellner, present moderator of the Canteen explained, that funds

raised from special events and the annual spaghetti supper underwrite the parish sports program.

"The soda fountain, fully equipped to serve ice cream, hamburgers, milk shakes, etc., a special drawing card. It is reserved almost entirely for the use at the canteen which makes it a special feature," he continued.

With record hops featuring visiting disc jockeys, as well as live bands, and the various parties and picnics, the Youth Canteen provides a diversified recreation program for the youth of St. Alphonsus.

Summing up the canteen purpose, Father Kellner said, "It provides enjoyable recreation for our young people in a wholesome atmosphere."
