High Mass In Italian Stirs Debate

Vatican City — (NC) — Vatican City's weekly magazine has entered into the controversy initiated by an Italian newspaper several weeks ago over the use of new musical compositions for vernacular sung Masses rather than older compositions written by the sung only in Latin.

The controversy began when the Rome daily, Il Messaggero, attacked the decision of the Liturgical Action Center of Bologna, Italy, archdiocese to promote a new vernacular Mass by the contemporary Italian composer, Luigi Picchi because it was "easy and popular."

Although the center later stated that it had chosen the Mass for a particular celebration—the forthcoming National Eucharistic Congress in Bologna—Il Messaggero continued to interpret the decision as favoring Picchi's music over that of past musical masters.

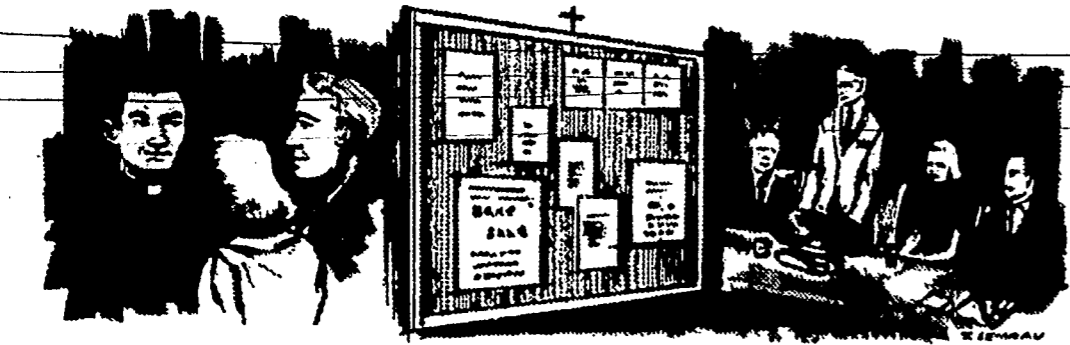
The newspaper's editorial strongly indicated its preference for older compositions in the sung Mass, even at the expense of the vernacular and congregation participation. It said the Bologna decision is a move to abandon the masterpieces of the past, particularly intricate polyphonic music which would be impossible for the entire congregation to sing.

L'Osservatore Della Domenica insisted that sung Masses in the vernacular are "fully legitimate and pastorally useful" and it supported the decision of the Bologna center.
